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Enhancing Access: The University System of Georgia's African-American Male Initiative

Funding Recommendations for Consideration by the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia

April 16, 2003



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- Mentoring and academic support of under-prepared students is needed at an early stage, as early as middle school.
- Several successful programs in the USG serve under-prepared students, including African-American males.
- Funding for these programs is a constant challenge; dependent on strained institutional funds, philanthropic and charitable giving.

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- Under the AAMI, six USG institutions and/or programs are being recommended to receive funding to pilot and/or expand initiatives aimed at enhancing the participation of African-American males.
- With the Board's approval, a total of \$60,000 will be dedicated to these USG programs/projects.
- These six institutions and programs will receive \$10,000 each to broaden the impact of their work:



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- Albany State University: to support targeted enrollment of African-American male students in their summer bridge program and to foster information sharing regarding their high retention rate;
- Atlanta Metropolitan College: to support the College's long-running Saturday Academy/PREP initiative, which cultivates under-prepared students in the K-12 pipeline to enhance their preparation for college;
- Coastal Georgia Community College: to support President Dorothy Lord's 10-year-old Minority Outreach Program aimed at encouraging Black males to complete high school and attend college;



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- Fort Valley State University: to support the launching of their new summer bridge program;
- Savannah State University: to provide funding for their successful PREP and TRIO programs and to help launch a new Summer Pipeline Program. Special efforts will be made to transition African-American male students from these pre-college programs into the university; and
- The University of Georgia: to support Deryl Bailey's "Project: Gentlemen on the Move," a mentoring and academic-support program which has been implemented successfully in three states.



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- All of the Pilot Programs will be evaluated. Two reports will reflect:
- ✓ Programs /initiatives to which the funds were directed;
- ✓ How many African-American males were impacted by the funding;
- ✓ Evaluation and measurement strategies used to assess the initiatives;
- ✓ How program successes were shared with other institutions; and
- ✓ How and at what cost the programs can be expanded/replicated for additional impact on the institution's and the System's goals.
