

### Tuition Recommendations

### **Undergraduate Tuition**

• No tuition increase for undergraduate students – 0% increase

### **Graduate Tuition**

- No tuition increase for gradate students 0% increase
- 4th year with no tuition increase in the last 6 years
- Recognizes financial hardships due to the pandemic as well as temporary additional support from federal government

- Effective Fall 2021



### Mandatory Student Fees

- Primary funding source for student activities, student technology, athletic programs, student centers, parking and transportation, health services, and other non-academic, student-focused facilities.
- Recommendation: No increases to any mandatory fees for FY 2022

Recommended: That the Board approve the proposed mandatory student fees for fiscal year 2022 for institutions of the University System of Georgia, to become effective Fall semester 2021 as detailed in Appendix II

# Elective Fees and Special Charges Requiring BOR Approval

- Enhanced Board Policy to increase review and oversight of certain elective fees and special charges
- Most elective fees and special charges will continue to be set at the institution level
- No increases to Board-approved fees and 6 fees recommended for discontinuation


### Total FY 2022 Operating Budget

Planning and Design (3 Projects)	6,200,000
Small Capital Projects (8 Projects)	32,650,000
GRA, GMC, GPTC	6,450,000
Georgia Public Libraries	11,600,000
Total – BOR Capital Budget	\$264,000,000
