MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA Atlanta, Georgia February 13, 2024

CALL TO ORDER

The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia met on Tuesday, February 13, 2024, in the Campus Recreation Center, Fourth Floor – at the Georgia Institute of Technology, 750 Ferst Drive, Atlanta, Georgia, and simultaneously accessible by BOR Webcast. Board Chair Harold Reynolds called the meeting to order at 8:32 a.m. Present in addition to Board Chair Reynolds, were Vice Chair T. Dallas Smith; Regents Doug Aldridge; Tom Bradbury; W. Allen Gudenrath; Erin Hames; Bárbara Rivera Holmes; Samuel D. Holmes; James M. Hull; Cade Joiner; Patrick C. Jones; C. Everett Kennedy, III; Sarah-Elizabeth Langford; Lowery Houston May; Jose R. Perez; Neil L. Pruitt, Jr.; Mathews D. Swift; and James K. Syfan, III. Chancellor Sonny Perdue was also present. Regent Richard T. Evans was excused.

INVOCATION AND PLEDGE

Harrison Baro, Student Government Association Executive Vice President at the Georgia Institute of Technology, gave the invocation and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

SAFETY BRIEFING

Gabrielle Masinko, the Georgia Institute of Technology Emergency Preparedness Coordinator, gave the safety briefing.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Upon a proper motion and variously seconded, the Regents present voted unanimously to approve the minutes of the January 17, 2024, Board meeting.

CAMPUS SPOTLIGHT: GEORGIA INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY & UNIVERSITY OF NORTH GEORGIA – "CYBER EDUCATION & TRAINING THE NATION'S NATIONAL SECURITY WORKFORCE"

President Ángel Cabrera of the Georgia Institute of Technology (GIT) and President Michael P. Shannon of the University of North Georgia (UNG) led the Campus Spotlight, "Cyber Education and Training the Nation's National Security Workforce." Presidents Cabrera and Shannon both gave opening remarks regarding the mutual institutions' accomplishments in winning first and second place for the National Security Agency's (NSA) Codebreaker Challenge. President Shannon shared that UNG and GIT's faculty, and students are contributing to the security of America through their cyber programs. He also expressed the need there is for talented cybersecurity professionals. President Shannon shared that there are more than 1.2 million positions in the cybersecurity workforce in the United States and more than 570,000 openings in that profession. President Cabrera shared that the need for cybersecurity professionals is also present in the state of Georgia where 19,000 open positions currently exist. He continued by stating nationally and in the state of Georgia GIT and UNG are answering the call both in developing technologies and graduating the best and brightest cybersecurity professionals. President Shannon added that developing cybersecurity workforce is critically important to GIT and UNG.

After Presidents Cabrera and Shannon's presentation, the following faculty members and students from GIT and UNG addressed the Board: Dr. Bryson Payne, UNG, Professor and Coordinator of Cyber Programs, 2021 Alumni Distinguished Professor; Cadet Matthew Perrino, UNG, Senior, Cybersecurity Major, Member of the Corps Cyber Unit and CyberHawks Competition Teams; Ms. Ada Arcinas, UNG, Sophomore, Cybersecurity Major, and CyberHawks Member; Dr. Taesoo Kim, GIT, Professor of Computer Science and Cybersecurity; Mr. Darin Mao, GIT, Second Year, Computer Science Major; and Mr. Joshua Wang, GIT, First Year, Computer Science Major. The first faculty member that addressed the Board was Dr. Bryson Payne, UNG. Dr. Payne shared that he has taught computer science and cybersecurity at UNG for twenty-six years and has coached cyber teams in the NSA's Codebreaker Challenge for the past ten years. Dr. Payne explained that the challenge is a one-hundred-day competition across more than four hundred universities in the United States that requires applied knowledge, technical skills, programming, cryptography, forensics, networking, software reverse engineering, and binary exploit analysis that trains the nation's best cybersecurity professionals to take down criminal, terrorist, and nation-state adversaries.

Next, Dr. Payne introduced Cadet Matthew Perrino, UNG. Cadet Perrino shared with the Board that he is an Operations Officer and that one of his favorite roles is overseeing peer training. Then Ms. Ada Arcinas, UNG, discussed her participation in various cybersecurity activities. In addition to being a member of CyberHawk, she is also a member of the Specialty Cyber Unit and Women in Technology. The next speaker to address the Board was Dr. Taesoo Kim, GIT. Dr. Kim stated that he does research in secure systems and since joining UNG in 2015 he has been offering a new class called Information Security Lab, which teaches a practical hacking skill. Then, Dr. Kim introduced Mr. Darin Mao, GIT, and shared that Mr. Mao is one of two of his best hackers. Mr. Mao shared that he has participated in security competitions since high school and stated that in terms of preparation, having hands-on-skills is especially important. Dr. Kim introduced the final speaker, Mr. Joshua Wang, GIT, the second student that he referred to as one of his best hackers. Mr. Wang shared that he is a first-year science student from Maryland and he too has participated in security competitions since high school. He continued by saying his first semester was great and he thinks that a position in security research would be an awesome career prospect. The experiences and explanations presented in GIT and UNG's campus spotlight – "Cyber Education and Training the Nation's National Security Workforce" reinforced the importance of cyber education and training in USG's institutions and its contributions to the security of the nation.

NATIONAL INSTITUTE FOR STUDENT SUCCESS (NISS)

Dr. Timothy M. Renick, Founding Executive Director, Georgia State University (GSU), gave a presentation on the National Institute for Student Success (NISS). Dr. Renick started his presentation by saying that GSU has been part of a vanguard of institutions that have redesigned student support systems, that is, the process of student registration, how faculty and staff advise students, assistance with financial aid, and the day-to-day communication with students. He stated that the changes are systematic – changes that touch every student, not only every semester, but in many cases every day. He also added that GSU is leveraging technologies and data to improve the systems much like what happens in private sectors. Dr. Renick shared how using the indicated techniques has improved GSU's graduation rate by approximately seventy percent. He continued by saying GSU is graduating 3,500 more students every year than a decade ago and is illuminating gaps in graduation rates based on race, ethnicity, and income levels. Dr. Renick continued his

presentation by saying NISS is dedicated to helping other institutions adopt the changes that he discussed and connect practitioner to practitioner so that these kind of changes can be scaled nationally.

CHANCELLOR'S REPORT

Chancellor Sonny Perdue gave his monthly report. He began by greeting everyone and wishing everyone an early Happy Valentine's Day. Then Chancellor Perdue thanked President Cabrera and his team for hosting the Board meeting and doing an outstanding job. He continued his report by saying that the success of USG's students is always a priority and more so when the System can celebrate what they have accomplished. Then, Chancellor Perdue announced that the University of Georgia (UGA) was awarded the 2024 Hunton Andrews Kurth Moot Court National Championship. He also shared that the tournament is by invitation only and is reserved for the top sixteen moot court programs from law schools across the country and this is the second year in a row that UGA has won the competition.

Chancellor Perdue continued his report by discussing SAT and ACT testing requirements, a topic that will be discussed further by the Board in the Spring. He shared that twenty-three of USG's institutions have continued a test optional waiver for the 2024-25 academic year; the institutions that do not have an optional waiver are the University of Georgia, the Georgia Institute of Technology, and Georgia College and State University and this is because they use a holistic admission process. Chancellor Perdue continued by saying, many institutions became test optional during the pandemic and, at last count, an estimated 1,900 schools have made standardized testing scores optional, and more than eighty schools do not require test scores. He followed up by saying that, at the time, it was suggested that a student's GPA was a better determinate for success than standardized scores.

Chancellor Perdue also reported that the amended Fiscal Year 2024 budget has passed the House, and now sits with the Senate, which includes the \$66 million restored to our institutional teaching budgets. He continued by saying that the budget also includes the \$1000 one-time bonuses that full-time staff members received in December 2023 and \$88 million to support the sourcing of a new Enterprise Resource Management (ERP) system. Chancellor Perdue also stated that USG has multiple capital projects funded as cash in the recommendations, including \$178 million for the Augusta University affiliated dental school at Georgia Southern University's Armstrong Campus in Savannah as well as the \$50 million for a new standalone medical school at UGA.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

There was no unfinished business to come before the Board.

NEW BUSINESS

Regent Cade Joiner announced that the 20th annual Board of Regents Gala will be held on Thursday, September 12, 2024, and encouraged everyone to "save the date" to attend. Regent Joiner also announced that 1.2 million dollars has been set as the goal to reach for scholarships and awards for this year's gala.

PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

Secretary to the Board Christopher McGraw announced that there were no timely petitions or communications for the Board to consider and that the Annual Planning Retreat will be held on March 12 and 13, 2024.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Board Chair Harold Reynolds called for an executive session at approximately 10:31 a.m. to discuss real estate matters, student records, and personnel matters. With a motion properly made and variously seconded, the Regents present voted unanimously to go into executive session. An affidavit regarding this executive session is on file with the Office of the Secretary to the Board.

Following executive session, Board Chair Harold Reynolds reconvened the Board meeting in its regular session at approximately 10:53 a.m. and announced that the Board took no actions during the executive session.

1. Fiscal Year 2025 Tuition

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board approve the proposed tuition rates for fiscal year (FY) 2025, to become effective Fall semester 2024. Recommended tuition rates appear in Appendix IA (Undergraduate Tuition), Appendix IB (Graduate & Professional Programs Tuition), and Appendix IC (eTuition).

<u>Background:</u> Maintaining affordability is one of the highest priorities of the Board of Regents and actions taken in recent years to keep tuition increases low or flat underscore this commitment. The Board of Regents has held tuition flat at most institutions for six of the last eight years. Furthermore, when comparing USG institutions nationally, USG ranks as the 6thth lowest in average tuition and fees compared to its public peers per College Board national data. Tuition and fees in the University System of Georgia remain an excellent value for students.

Escalating costs for goods and services, increased salary requirements coupled with competition from the private sector, and overall inflation has created the need for tuition increases in FY 2025. The recommended strategy for FY 2025 balances affordability, sustainability, and quality at all institutions.

Proposed Undergraduate Tuition Rate Increases:

Specifically, the components of the undergraduate rate increase proposal are as follows:

- 1. A tuition increase of 2.5% for in-state students.
- 2. A tuition increase of 5.0% for out-state students.
- 3. Establish a new tier for out-of-country students, which is 2.0% higher than the rate for out-state students.
- 4. There are also a few special cases as noted below.

Middle Georgia State University:

Beginning in FY23, the Board approved a plan to bring undergraduate tuition rates at Middle Georgia State University to the level of other State Universities over a three-year period. The proposed increases for FY25 represent the third and final year of the plan.

State Colleges:

The recommended tuition rates initiate a plan to bring the State Colleges, excluding Georgia Gwinnett College, to a single tuition rate over three years. There are currently 4 different rates among the 9 State Colleges. Many of these institutions have tuition rates currently under \$100, which is the per credit-hour rate charged by the Technical College System of Georgia. The impacted institutions are Atlanta Metropolitan State College, East Georgia State College, Georgia Highlands College, South Georgia State College, and Perimeter College at Georgia State University, which functions like a State College. The additional per credit-hour increase for an in-state student ranges from \$3 to \$4.

1. Fiscal Year 2025 Tuition (continued)

Dual Mission Institutions:

Albany State University (ASU) and the University of North Georgia (UNG) have dual missions. Through consolidation, both institutions have an access mission and have two different tuition rates for associates and baccalaureate programs.

ASU and UNG have models in which students elect to enroll as either an associate degree or bachelor's degree seeking student. The recommendation includes a plan to move the tuition rates at ASU and UNG for the Access Mission/Two-Year Degree programs to the rates charged by Georgia Gwinnett College, with the transition taking place over a three-year period. The plan continues to honor the affordability aspect of the access mission, while supporting the costs associated with staffing these programs with baccalaureate level instructors. The additional per credit-hour increase for an in-state student ranges from \$9 to \$13.

Proposed Graduate Tuition Rate Increases:

Specifically, the components of the graduate rate increase proposal are as follows:

- 1. A tuition increase of 2.5% for in-state students.
- 2. A tuition increase of 5.0% for out-state students.
- 3. Establish a new tier for out-of-country students, which is 2.0% higher than the rate for out-state students.
- 4. A tuition increase of 2.5% for all single-priced, total cost graduate programs.
- 5. There are also a few special cases as noted below.

Master of Health Science in Speech-Language Pathology at Augusta University

At the November 8, 2022 meeting, the Board approved the new Master of Health Science in Speech-Language Pathology at Augusta University. The program's tuition will be set to match the existing tuition rates for the Master of Health Science in Occupational Therapy.

Veterinary Medicine at the University of Georgia (UGA)

UGA's College of Veterinary Medicine (CVM) is proudly ranked #7 in the nation by US News and World Report. The CVM currently also has the lowest cost of attendance in the nation for instate students and eighth lowest cost for out-of-state students. The tuition recommendation includes an increase of \$62 per credit-hour for all students in the program. This will help maintain a high-quality educational experience by providing funds for competitive faculty salaries (hiring the best), curricular experiences (providing relevant and modern pedagogies), and physical facilities (maintaining and expanding the CVM built environment).

Core Graduate Tuition at the University of Georgia

The core graduate full-time tuition for the University of Georgia is currently less than their undergraduate full-time rate. The recommended tuition rates include a plan to bring the full-time graduate tuition rate to the full-time undergraduate rate over three years. In year one, this

represents an additional \$19 per credit-hour for in-state students before the increases applied to all graduate rates as noted above.

Proposed eTuition Increases:

Specifically, the components of the eTution rate increase proposal are as follows:

- 1. A tuition increase of 2.5% for eTuition rates, with exceptions as noted below.
- 2. A tuition increase of 8.0% for the three Degrees at Scale programs at the Georgia Institute of Technology.
- 3. No tuition increase for eCore, eMajor and the Valdosta State University eDegree.
- 4. eTuition rates for online undergraduate courses at Atlanta Metropolitan State College, East Georgia State College, Perimeter College at GSU, Albany State University Two Year Degrees and the University of North Georgia Associate Track will be the same as the undergraduate in-state rate.
- 5. The eTuition rates for the Masters in Education Leadership online (M.Ed) and the Specialist in Educational Leadership online (Ed. S) at Columbus State University (CSU) are being reduced and will be set to the approved graduate eTuition rate for CSU. This is being done to improve competitiveness as the current rates are high when compared to peer institutions.

2. Fiscal Year 2025 Mandatory Fees

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board approve the proposed mandatory student fee rates for fiscal year 2025, to become effective Fall semester 2024. Recommended mandatory student fees appear in Appendix IIA.

<u>Background</u>: Mandatory student fees continue to be an important component of the overall cost of attendance at all our colleges and universities. By policy, the Board of Regents approves all mandatory fees and certain elective fees and special charges. The most common mandatory fees include intercollegiate athletic fees; student health service fees; student activity fees; parking and transportation fees; technology fees; and fees to support private funding of facilities such as recreation centers, parking decks, student centers and similar projects.

In recent years, the University System has experienced significant growth in the number of students attending classes via fully online course delivery. Many institutions waive most mandatory fees for fully online students. For fiscal year 2025, the recommendation is to change the underlying mandatory fee structure as it relates to fully online students. The proposed structure would continue to allow institutions to charge online students fees at a reduced rate but would require that fully online students be charged an Online Learning Fee that must equal or exceed the institution's technology fee plus fifty percent of all the institution's mandatory fees approved by the Board of Regents. Six institutions have historically charged all mandatory fees to fully online students. For those institutions, it is recommended that their Online Learning Fee continue to be equal to the total of all their board approved mandatory fees. The recommended change for fully online students will require a revision to board policy, which will be recommended in the next item.

The recommendations contained in Appendix IIA were developed following a review of institutional fee requests that considered, among other things, the current financial position of the programs and activities supported by fees, and the impact of the new fee structure related to fully online students.

3. Revisions to Board of Regents Policy Manual, Section 7.3.4.2 Waiver of Mandatory Fees

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board approve the proposed revisions to the Board of Regents Policy Manual, 7.3.4.2 Waiver of Mandatory Fees.

<u>Background:</u> The purpose of the recommended policy change is to bring policy language in line with the new proposed mandatory fee structure to charge fully online students a portion of all mandatory fees, which will be named the Online Learning Fee. Additionally, all references to the special institutional fee are being removed as this fee has been eliminated.

The Online Learning Fee may be pro-rated for part-time, online students, per each institution's policy for part time proration and in accordance with Section 7.3.4.2. As with other mandatory fees, this fee may be included in bundled "One Rate" program costs that include tuition, fees, and other costs of attendance that have been approved by the Board of Regents, and in other programs with differential costs addressed by Board Policy 7.3.1.5 – Tuition Agreements with Corporations, Organizations, and Other Legal Entities. In such cases, the Online Learning Fee may be included in the bundled cost approved for program delivery and does not necessarily need to be billed separately if those programs are delivered online. Special program fee rates previously approved by the Board will remain intact.

Please note, strikethrough text represents a deletion from the current version, and highlighted text represents an addition.

EDITED POLICY LANGUAGE:

7.3.4.2 Waiver of Mandatory Fees

An institution may waive or reduce mandatory fees, except the special institutional fee, for:

- 1. Students who are enrolled for fewer than six credit hours;
- 2. Students enrolled in summer semesters;
- 3. Students who reside or are jointly enrolled at another institution;
- 4. Students enrolled in practicum experiences (e.g., student teachers) or internships located at least 50 miles from the institution;
- 5. Students enrolled in distance learning courses or programs who are not also enrolled in on-campus courses nor residing on campus. Such students shall be charged an Online Learning Fee that must equal or exceed the institution's Technology Fee plus fifty percent (50%) of all other Board approved institutional mandatory fees.
- 6. Students enrolled at off-campus centers, except that the institution shall be authorized to charge select fees to these students for special services subject to approval by the Board of Regents;

- 7. Students enrolled in a study abroad program and not enrolled on campus during that same semester; and,
- 8. Members of the armed services utilizing the military's tuition assistance programs or paying their own way to attend the institution.

Waivers and exemptions of the special institutional fee are specifically addressed in the Resolution approved by the Board of Regents on April 12, 2012.

Each USG institution shall document its student fee waiver strategy or plan. Upon request, USG institutions shall provide the student fee waiver plans to the Chancellor or his or her designee.

PROPOSED NEW POLICY LANGUAGE:

7.3.4.2 Waiver of Mandatory Fees

An institution may waive or reduce mandatory fees for:

- 1. Students who are enrolled for fewer than six credit hours;
- 2. Students enrolled in summer semesters;
- 3. Students who reside or are jointly enrolled at another institution;
- 4. Students enrolled in practicum experiences (e.g., student teachers) or internships located at least 50 miles from the institution;
- 5. Students enrolled in distance learning courses or programs who are not also enrolled in on-campus courses nor residing on campus. Such students shall be charged an Online Learning Fee that must equal or exceed the institution's Technology Fee plus fifty percent (50%) of all other Board approved institutional mandatory fees.
- 6. Students enrolled at off-campus centers, except that the institution shall be authorized to charge select fees to these students for special services subject to approval by the Board of Regents;
- 7. Students enrolled in a study abroad program and not enrolled on campus during that same semester; and,
- 8. Members of the armed services utilizing the military's tuition assistance programs or paying their own way to attend the institution.

Each USG institution shall document its student fee waiver strategy or plan. Upon request, USG institutions shall provide the student fee waiver plans to the Chancellor or his or her designee.

Committee of the Whole: Tuition, Fees and Allocations

4. <u>Fiscal Year 2025 Elective Fees and Special Charges</u>

<u>Recommended</u>: Pursuant to Board Policy 7.3.2.2, that the Board approve the fiscal year 2025 elective fees and special charges as outlined in Appendix IIB. These fees for institutions of the University System of Georgia become effective Fall semester 2024.

<u>Background:</u> Elective fees and special charges represent all other fees assessed to students outside of mandatory fees and impact the overall cost of higher education.

With student affordability as a driving priority, changes have been made to Board policy to increase the level of scrutiny and oversight of certain elective fees and special charges. Specifically, in January 2010, fees and special charges assessed to all students in a specific degree program began requiring Board approval. In February 2015, the Board approved additional policy revisions to ensure that fees charged to all students within a particular course are necessary and provide a direct and additional benefit to the classroom and educational experience. Course fees and degree program fees are not intended to supplant tuition, but rather cover costs of supplemental materials. While most elective fees and special charges are approved at the institutional level, the policy revisions enhance the oversight of fees pertaining to instructional activities. It is noteworthy that many of the elective fee changes presented for approval this year are driven by curricular changes, particularly in Nursing programs, in which the courses are transitioning to digital courseware packages that bundle licensure testing preparation materials with classroom instructional materials. In many cases, these courseware packages replace traditional textbooks and can result in overall cost savings for students.

As required by Board policy 7.3.2.2, elective fees and special charges are reviewed on an annual basis to determine use, effectiveness, and appropriateness. The recommendations are contained in Appendix IIB.

5. <u>Fiscal Year 2025 Budget Allocations</u>

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board approve the allocation of state appropriations for fiscal year 2025 among institutions and operating units of the University System of Georgia ("USG") as outlined in Appendix IIIB and Appendix IIIC. All allocations for FY 2025 are pending the Governor's signing of House Bill 916, the Appropriations Act for FY 2025.

<u>Further Recommended</u>: That the Board approve the FY 2025 Capital Budget, totaling \$136,405,800 as outlined in Appendix IV.

<u>Background:</u> The total state funds budget for the USG at the beginning of FY 2024 was \$3.18 billion. The recommended state funds budget for FY 2025 is \$3.39 billion. Appendix IIIA lists the changes from FY 2024 to FY 2025. Allocations by institution are shown in Appendix IIIB. Appendix IIIC lists the changes from FY 2024 to FY 2025 in the Special Funding Initiatives.

FY 2025 Budget:

The total state funds budget for FY 2025 is \$3.39 billion, including \$3.07 billion in formula funds and \$324.24 million in all other line items. The FY 2025 budget represents a total net increase of \$204.38 million, or 6.4%.

FY 2025 Allocation Recommendations:

Allocations of state funds by institution are listed in Appendix IIIB:

- The strategy employed in allocating the \$2.26 million in enrollment funding seeks to appropriate funding for growth while mitigating reductions on a case-by-case basis after carefully assessing the impact on each institution.
- Restoration of FY24 formula funds were allocated in the same manner as reduced for each institution in the prior year.
- Allocations of funding for maintenance and operations for new space are allocated based on institutional projections of cost increases.
- Allocations of funding for health insurance and TRS increases are allocated based on institutional benefit enrollment.
- Allocations of funding for cost-of-living increases of 4%, capped at \$3,000 are allocated based on employees' salary.
- Any changes identified specifically by House Bill 916 were made accordingly.

FY 2025 Capital Budget:

The total budget for capital projects for the Board of Regents is \$136.4 million. The capital projects are listed in Appendix IV and are summarized as follows:

- \$46.9 million in construction funds for projects at Albany State University, College of Coastal Georgia, Georgia College & State University, Middle Georgia State University, and the University of West Georgia.
- \$31.6 million in design and construction funds for projects at Georgia Gwinnett College, Savannah State University, and the University of Georgia.
- \$5.8 million in planning and design funds for Clayton State University, Georgia Highlands College, Georgia Southwestern State University, and the University of Georgia.
- \$34.4 million for eight small capital projects at various institutions.
- \$12.7 million for public libraries.
- \$1.9 million for the Georgia Military College.
- \$3 million for the Georgia Research Alliance.

I. Academic Programs

New Program Requests

1. <u>Establishment of a Bachelor of Business Administration with a Major in General Business, East Georgia State College</u>

Recommended: That the Board approve the request from President David Schecter that East Georgia State College be authorized to establish a Bachelor of Business Administration with a Major in General Business, effective spring 2025.

Degree Name/Classification of Instructional Program/Modality:

Bachelor of Business Administration with a Major in General Business

52.010101 Business/Commerce, General

On Campus or Online (Asynchronous)

System and Institutional Context

System-Wide/Strategic Plan Context (within mission fit):

The program will address the workforce needs of the region through industry collaboration to develop real world experiences in the form of internships and work integrated learning. Students will be required to participate in a structured career professional development program with engagement with local businesses. An integral part of the curriculum is the inclusion of optional concentrations provided through collaboration with eCampus and the Georgia FinTech Academy. Students will complete either the general business pathway or one of the optional concentrations. The four optional concentrations that will initially be offered include Organizational Leadership, Health Care Administration, Office Administration and Technology, and Financial Technology. Additional concentrations will be added once the MOUs are in place for the WIRC program, Data Analytics, and the Georgia Film Academy.

Institutional Mission Fit:

The Bachelor of Business Administration will extend the existing offering of the Associate of Science in Business Administration, which is the largest discipline specific academic program with 319 students in Fall 2023 and 37 degrees conferred in FY23. This program offering is a key component of our strategic enrollment management plan targeted at not only attracting new students, but more importantly, retaining existing students.

EGSC currently offers two bachelor's degrees through eCampus; this BBA would be their first on campus bachelor's degree offering.

Need/Workforce Context

The College engaged Hanover Research to conduct a program needs assessment for our region; the following are key findings from the report:

- A. Unlike the overall trend, state colleges and regional comprehensive universities are enjoying higher-than-average conferral growth for business bachelor's degrees in the surrounding regions.
- B. Graduates of a business program should enter a robust labor market in the EGSC local region. Employment of business-related occupations is projected to grow 16% over the next decade, faster than the overall growth of 11% in the local region.
- C. The EGSC local region is expected to see a high employment deficit of General and Operations Managers over the next ten years.
- D. The EGSC local region job postings for business occupations typically require a bachelor's degree. Over 80% of job postings from the prior year requested a bachelor's degree.

Experiential Opportunities (High Impact Practices):

As the only on campus baccalaureate degree, this program would significantly increase opportunities for EGSC students in experiential learning through internships, service-learning, and collaborative team-based assignments as well as global learning through USG Goes Global study abroad programs and required coursework in international business/communications.

Assessment Plan:

The program learning outcomes will be assessed in accordance with the current program assessment process at EGSC. Additional assessment of student learning will take place using the ETS Major Field Test in Business as a graduation requirement. Pre and post assessments may be conducted through an EGSC developed instrument. Employment and graduate school placement rates will also be monitored.

Pipeline:

They expect many students who pursue the AS Business Administration will continue to the BBA, and new students to East Georgia will come specifically for the BBA.

Marketing Plan:

Primary marketing of the program will take place in conjunction with promotion of all EGSC programs to high school students. Additional promotion will take place within the current EGSC student population to ensure AS students are fully aware of this option to complete a bachelor's degree. The program will also be marketed to prospective non-traditional students. Adult learners, and/or those returning to college after a break, will be able to transfer in up to

15 hours of general electives, regardless of their prior course of study. Credit for prior learning will also be an option for many of the introductory level business courses and/or courses in the concentrations.

Financial Impacts:

Existing faculty and staff who support the AS in Business Administration will also support this program. They anticipate the need for three new full-time faculty (staggered for hire in years 2-4) and will use part-time faculty until the enrollment supports the hire of the full-time faculty.

Facility Impacts:

One classroom would be converted to a computer lab, paid for through federal grant funds the institution has already been awarded.

Technology Impacts:

The computers needed for the extra computer classroom will be purchased through the aforementioned grant.

2. Establishment of a Master of Professional Accountancy, University of Georgia

Recommended: That the Board approve the request from President Jere Morehead that University of Georgia be authorized to establish a Master of Professional Accountancy, effective fall 2025.

System and Institutional Context

System-Wide/Strategic Plan Context (within mission fit):

The MPAcc program will not only meet a number of needs in the State's economy but will also offer an affordable, accessible, and quality program to working professionals who wish to improve their chances of lifelong success, thereby advancing the state, nation, and world.

More specifically, the MPAcc program, while addressing all strategic goals in the USG's 2024 strategic plan (student success, stewardship, economic competitiveness, and community impact), will most directly address the first three goals. First, the MPAcc will eliminate both time and economic barriers that might otherwise prevent experienced professionals from gaining additional accounting education. As an online, asynchronous program, professionals can complete the coursework according to their schedule. Second, the MPAcc program will not only be internally efficient from a cost perspective but will also be offered at a tuition rate that is lower than most competing programs. In other words, MPAcc students will receive world-class instruction at a reasonable price, at minimal cost to the USG and UGA. Third, the MPAcc program directly addresses the USG's economic competitiveness goal by providing students with readily marketable, high-demand accounting skills and knowledge. These skills are highly sought after by a wide variety of employers, offering graduates lifelong opportunity as well as economic security.

Institutional Mission Fit:

The MPAcc will provide the necessary knowledge, skills, and expertise for graduates in the high-demand area of accounting, including data analytics, financial and managerial accounting, and taxation. One of the missions of UGA is its commitment to excellence in public service, economic development, and technical assistance activities designed to address the strategic needs of the state of Georgia. This program will provide a well-trained workforce in a critical economic area, thus expanding the pipeline for accounting professionals in the state and benefiting employers and employees alike. The development of the MPAcc program also aligns well with the larger goal of establishing the University of Georgia as a leader in the field, expanding employment opportunities across the state. The program will allow students from both rural and urban areas to pursue a graduate education from the state's flagship institution at a small cost, both in terms of tuition and time away

from employment. As such, the program will expand opportunities for a diverse range of students, including first generation and rural students as well as students from outside the state wishing to earn a degree from a top accounting program.

Need/Workforce Context

This proposal is the result of a market research study indicating significant demand for an online Master of Accounting program for experienced professionals without an undergraduate accounting degree. There is no other comparable program in the USG. Other accounting master's programs at UGA or other USG schools require an undergraduate accounting degree or substantial undergraduate accounting prerequisites.

Based on a market analysis conducted for Terry and Tull by Hanover Research, the proposed program aligns well with local, regional, state, and national talent demands and workforce strategies. Per Hanover, "labor demand for accounting-related positions is considerable and stable. Employment growth for accounting-related positions is expected to be higher than average in Georgia and across the Southeast region in the next decade." The market is strongest for accountants and auditors, which represent the largest number of workers by far. The Association of International Certified Professional Accountants (AICPA) reports that a considerable proportion of new staff hired into accounting or finance functions of American CPA firms come from outside of the field of accounting, with 19% of hires having a master's degree in accounting and 33% holding a bachelor's degree in accounting, with other hires coming from other business- or finance-related fields.

Learning Outcomes

Upon or soon after graduation, MPAcc graduates should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate broad educational preparation for careers in business.
- 2. Demonstrate technical competence in:
 - a. Financial accounting, reporting and analysis.
 - b. Accounting systems and auditing.

Experiential Opportunities (High Impact Practices):

Students will be assigned group assignments and projects in several of the courses in the program. While the program is online and asynchronous, the course platforms used by UGA are sufficient to support these collaborative assignments and projects. For example, in the tax courses, students will be asked to complete tax return projects, including tax returns, Excel workpapers, and similar deliverables as a group to foster teamwork and to simulate the working environment in many accounting firms and corporate tax departments. Similarly, students in audit courses will be assigned group projects to practice important audit concepts and utilize analytical tools and software to simulate projects assigned to staff auditors as part of a financial statement audit. Similar collaborations experiences will be woven into other courses throughout the curriculum in both required courses and electives.

Assessment Plan:

Outcomes for graduates of the program will be assessed using the following measures:

- Survey of graduating MPAcc students (annually)
- Survey of alumni (every three years)
- Survey of employers (every three years)
 Success of students in obtaining positions in accounting and business (annually)
- Salaries of students seeking employment upon graduation with MPAcc degree (annually)

Pipeline:

The Master of Professional Accountancy (MPAcc) at the University of Georgia allows working professionals with non-accounting undergraduate degrees to earn a graduate degree in accounting from a top-tier program in as little as one year without interrupting their lives. With courses delivered entirely online, students can continue to work full-time while preparing to take the next step in their career, including becoming CPA exam eligible. By pairing core accounting coursework with relevant electives, students can customize their MPAcc experience to suit their professional experience and career goals.

Marketing Plan:

The department will use its existing partnership with Carnegie to do digital marketing for the new MPAcc program. Faculty will also utilize social media, contacts with alumni, advisory board members, and current employers to market the program. The Tull School of Accounting and Terry College of Business have existing efforts to increase underrepresented student populations in business education in place and will build on these efforts to market and recruit for the MPAcc program. In addition, given the 2 years post-baccalaureate work experience requirement, the MPAcc will, by definition, target adult learners.

Financial Impacts:

No new faculty positions are required; eleven existing faculty will each teach one course in this program. One additional staff member may become necessary as enrollment increases.

3. <u>Establishment of a Doctor of Philosophy with a Major in Neuroscience and Neurotechnology, Georgia Institute of Technology</u>

Recommended: That the Board approve the request from President Ángel Cabrera that Georgia Institute of Technology be authorized to establish a Doctor of Philosophy with a Major in Neuroscience and Neurotechnology, effective summer 2025.

On Campus

System and Institutional Context

System-Wide/Strategic Plan Context (within mission fit):

The USG Strategic Plan 2029 includes a Student Success goal and a Community Impact goal. The Ph.D. with a Major in Neuroscience and Neurotechnology aims to be at the forefront of innovation, developing new technologies that not only impact the economy, but also individual quality of life, most especially for those with neuro challenges that affect the brain and/or nervous system. Therefore, this proposed degree is directly aligned with the USG Strategic Plan 2029.

Institutional Mission Fit:

As stated in the Georgia Tech mission, we are "committed to developing leaders who advance technology and improve the human condition." This focus on improving the lives of people globally through technological breakthroughs naturally aligns Georgia Tech with the discipline of neuroscience.

As the vision and mission of Georgia Tech becomes realized, this will naturally create a university uniquely able to deliver on the goals of the future of neuroscience. This vision and mission are achieved by ongoing efforts to recruit the best in science and engineering to the Institute that can teach and lead research in exciting new frontiers. This drive will naturally provide new training opportunities for students both in the classroom and in research.

Need/Workforce Context

Neuroscience is generating new products, such as functional electrical stimulation as common means for rehabilitation and pain relief, and neuro-inspired products such as improved voice recognition systems, which directly translate into sales and jobs. The breadth of employment opportunities can be further appreciated from the list of major branches of modern neuroscience: computational neuroscience, neuroengineering, cultural and social neuroscience, neuroimaging, cognitive and behavioral neuroscience, developmental

neuroscience, neurolinguistics, etc. To that end, employment opportunities for neuroscientists are surging. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), jobs for medical scientists, including neuroscientists, are projected to grow by 17% between 2020 and 2030, which is faster than the average for all occupations. A larger and aging population, increased rates of several chronic conditions, expansion of technology, and a growing reliance on pharmaceuticals are all factors that are expected to increase demand for neuroscientists. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the median annual salary earned by medical scientists, the category under which neuroscientists fall, was \$91,510 in 2020. Those classified under the scientific research and development services industry have an average annual salary of \$104,310.

Neuroscientists improve lives by developing interventions such as medication, rehabilitation, and neuromodulation to treat patients with neurological disorders. They must possess a Ph.D. or M.D. to engage in clinical work, direct academic research, or lead research and development in public and private sectors.

There is a growing demand for neuroscience across many industries.

Curriculum

Learning Outcomes

- Demonstrate knowledge of the integration of the nervous system with the organism, and how it relates to behavior.
- Ability to apply statistical principles to scientific data, and use code to analyze data.
- Demonstrate recognition and comprehension of concepts in neurophysiology that can be leveraged for discovery.

- Demonstrate knowledge of the history of the field and development of scientific theories in neuroscience.
- Demonstrate knowledge of modern advances in neuroscience and neurotechnology.
- Ability to integrate technological approaches to solve scientific problems; utilization of methodologies to support discovery.
- Ability to propose and develop informed hypotheses and experimentation.

Experiential Opportunities (High Impact Practices):

- First-year Experiences students in the program will engage in a cohort model that keeps them in academic curriculum and professional development activities together in their first year, to develop a stronger sense of community.
- Common Intellectual Experiences all students in the program will take part in seminars and professional development throughout their time in the program.
- Collaborative assignments and projects in their academic curriculum, students will be engaged in group projects that focus on data collection and analysis, which will develop their skills to support collaboration in their thesis projects.
- Diversity/Global Learning students will be required to have an academically diverse committee, inclusive of scientists and engineers or computer scientists, along with identifying collaborations that can allow them the ability to expand their intellectual engagement. This can involve collaborators from other countries.
- Internships Students will be able to identify potential corporate partners to engage in internships that may support their thesis research.

Assessment Plan:

All academic programs at Georgia Tech are subject to assessment using the Assessment Planning and Reporting Template for Academic Programs provided by the Office of Academic Effectiveness. This provides a process to promote continued program improvement by relating Expected Outcomes to (1) Appropriate Measures, (2) Acceptable Targets, (3) Collection, Analysis, and review of Results, and (4) Use of Results to Improve Outcomes.

Outcomes for students will be assessed based on in-person exit interviews with the Program Director and analyses conducted by the Academic Program Coordinator to determine attrition rates, placement rates and starting salaries. This will be combined with the Institute's online survey of graduates. The results of these interviews and surveys are important components of the continuous program improvement plan.

Pipeline:

The student demand for Ph.D. training in neuroscience is very high. According to the National Center for Educational Statistics, during 2016-2017, universities in the state of Georgia conferred 218 undergraduate degrees in neuroscience (Agnes Scott College, 10; Emory University, 127; Georgia State University, 78; Mercer University, 3). Georgia Tech's new undergraduate in Neuroscience presently has over 300 majors and is expected to grow to ~400 majors by 2022. This will contribute ~80 additional B.S. graduates to the state's production each year. Georgia Tech is positioned to grow in this area by offering a unique Ph.D. program to keep and train exceptional students in the state of Georgia and take advantage of the private sector and national funding efforts.

Marketing Plan:

Students will be recruited to the program to initiate study in fall 2025. Students currently enrolled in other doctoral programs at Georgia Tech will be permitted to change their major to Neuroscience starting summer 2025.

The program recruitment will be led by a dedicated 0.5 FTE Academic Program Manager hired for the Neuroscience Ph.D. program. The participating schools run vibrant graduate recruiting programs based on advertising the program nationally to target B.S. majors in, for example, neuroscience, psychology, and biology. The program will recruit at undergraduate-serving conferences, including those that attract significant numbers of minority students (e.g., SACNAS).

Financial Impacts:

All classes will be cross-listed with existing courses. Existing faculty and staff will be used; a .33 FTE academic program coordinator is being requested as new.

Facility Impacts: None; using existing resources.

Technology Impacts: None.

4. Columbus State University

Recommended: That the Board approve the request of President Stuart Rayfield that Columbus State University ("CSU") be approved to terminate the following degree programs effective Summer 2024.

- a. Master of Arts with a Major in History (CIP Code 54010101)
- b. Bachelor of Arts with a major in Mathematics (CIP Code 27010101)
- c. Bachelor of Science in Education with a major in Health, Physical Education (CIP Code 13131401)
- d. Bachelor of Science with a major in Exercise Science (CIP Code 31050501)

<u>Abstract</u>: As part of an overall review process of deactivated programs, Columbus State is requesting termination of the above programs. The MA in History was originally deactivated due to low enrollments and has had no students enrolled since spring 2021. The BA in Mathematics was consolidated with the BS in Mathematics in fall 2020. The BSEd in Health, Physical Education and the BS in Exercise Science were consolidated in spring 2019 to create a then new BS Kinesiology.

5. Kennesaw State University

Recommended: That the Board approve the request of President Kathy Schwaig that Kennesaw State University be approved to terminate the following degree programs effective Summer 2024.

a. Bachelor of Science with a Major in Mathematics Education (CIP Code 13131101)

<u>Abstract</u>: In Spring 2018, Kennesaw State University consolidated their secondary teacher education programs into a single BSEd in Secondary Education. The other programs that were consolidated (biology education, chemistry education, and physics education) were terminated at that time, but this program remained while students were completing their program of study. There have been no students in this disagree since spring 2020.

6. Georgia Southern University

Recommended: That the Board approve the request of President Kyle Marrero that Georgia Southern University be approved to terminate the following degree programs effective Summer 2024.

- a. Bachelor of Science in Public Health with a Major in Health Education and Promotion (CIP Code 51.220701)
- b. Specialist in Education with a Major in Educational Leadership (CIP Code 13.040101)

<u>Abstract</u>: These degrees are being proposed for termination due to lack of enrollment. The BS in Public Health program has had no students since spring 2021 when the program was restructured, and the Educational Leadership program has had no students since spring 2020.

7. Kennesaw State University

Recommended: That the Board approve the request by President Kathy Schwaig that Kennesaw State University (KSU) revise its institutional mission statement, effective immediately.

Abstract: Culminating from work related to a new university strategic plan, KSU's proposed new mission state was informed by the work of the strategic planning committee, as well as feedback from the community and other external stakeholders and shared Governance groups. The proposed mission is in alignment with Board Policy 2.8, which requires institutional missions align with both the overall University System of Georgia mission as well as the specific requirements for comprehensive universities.

<u>Current Mission Statement</u>: At Kennesaw State, we serve as a powerful example of the impact a student-centered, research-driven university education can deliver. We help students succeed through exploration, collaboration, and rigor, uniting a diverse spectrum of backgrounds and talents. At KSU, students become the individuals who people want as colleagues and leaders.

<u>Proposed Mission Statement</u>: Kennesaw State University transforms lives through academic excellence, innovative research, strong community partnerships, and economic opportunity. We empower our students to become thought leaders, lifelong learners, and informed global citizens by cultivating an inclusive environment that encourages free expression and civil discourse.

8. Establishments

Ark Professorship

Recommended: That the Board approve the request of President Jere Morehead that University of Georgia be authorized to establish the Ark Professorship, effective April 16, 2024.

IV. Extension of University System of Georgia Test Optional Waiver

Recommended: That the Board approve the request of Chancellor Sonny Perdue to continue to waive SAT/ACT scores for admissions into the majority of USG schools through academic year 2025 - 2026, effective April 16, 2024. The institutions for which SAT/ACT scores will continue to be required are University of Georgia, Georgia Institute of Technology, and Georgia College and State University.

Abstract: In August 2020, the USG approved the temporary adjustment of admission requirements for USG institutions due to uncertainty about the availability of SAT/ACT testing during the COVID-19 pandemic. USG made the decision after monitoring testing availability during the spring and summer, when multiple test date cancellations prevented thousands of students from having access to a testing opportunity.

The temporary adjustment allowed students to apply for admission without submitting SAT or ACT scores at state colleges, state universities, comprehensive universities and research universities in the USG for the Spring, Summer and Fall 2021 semesters. Students that had SAT/ACT scores could still submit them.

In April 2023, the USG extended the temporary waiver 2024 - 2025, and the Chancellor requests that the BOR extend this waiver through academic year 2025 - 2026.

Dear Mr. McGraw, Chancellor Perdue and Members of the Board of Regents:

I would like to request approval for Georgia College & State University (GCSU) to award an Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters to **Dr. Lisa D. Cook** at the University's May 2024 Commencement ceremonies. For the reasons that follow, I would appreciate your consideration of this request, which carries the unanimous approval of the GCSU Honorary Award Committee.

Dr. Cook is a native of Milledgeville, Georgia, and was raised here in Baldwin County by her parents, the late Payton B. Cook and Mary M. Cook. Her mother was a professor of nursing here at GCSU and was the first tenured African-American faculty member of this University. Her father was the chaplain at Central State Hospital for 36 years, and a community leader who guided many local organizations and served on a wide variety of charitable boards, including the Georgia College & State University Foundation Board of Trustees. One of the most prominent buildings on the Central State campus is named in honor of Mr. Cook.

Dr. Cook recently became the first African-American woman in America to be appointed as a Governor of the Federal Reserve Board, nominated by President Biden and initially confirmed by the U.S. Senate in May 2022. She was subsequently renominated by the President to serve a full 14-year term on the Board of Governors and was sworn in on September 13, 2023 for a new term ending January 31, 2038. She is only the fourth native Georgian to serve on the Federal Reserve Board since its inception.¹

Dr. Cook earned a BA in Physics and Philosophy from Spelman College, *magna cum laude*, and two years later as a Marshall Scholar, earned another BA in Philosophy, Politics, and Economics from the University of Oxford in England. She further studied philosophy at the University of Senegal. In 1997, she earned a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of

California, Berkeley, after which she joined the faculty of Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government.

¹ Only three other native Georgians have ever served as Governors of the Federal Reserve, according to the office of the Federal Reserve Historian, Dr. Jonathan Rose: (1) Chairman Ben Bernanke (tenure: 2006-2014) was born in Augusta, but raised in South Carolina; (2) Eugene Black (tenure: 1933-1934) was born in Atlanta; and (3) William McAdoo (tenure: 1913-1918) was born near Marietta.

She subsequently became a professor of economics and international relations at Michigan State University, a position she held until her appointment to the Federal Reserve Board. Her research over the years has focused on economic growth and development, innovation, financial institutions and markets, and economic history.

From 2018 to 2021, Dr. Cook was director of the American Economic Association Summer Training Program. She was also a research associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research. From 2011 to 2012, Dr. Cook served as a senior economist on the Council of Economic Advisers under President Obama. From 2000 to 2001, she served as a senior adviser on finance and development in the U.S. Department of Treasury's Office of International Affairs.

In 2004, Dr. Cook and her sisters Pamela Y. Cook and Melanie Cook McCant established an endowed scholarship fund known as the "Mary and Payton Cook Scholars Fund" with the GCSU Foundation, which had a market value on December 31, 2023 of more than \$50,000.

Dr. Cook has agreed to serve as the Commencement Speaker at Georgia College & State University's May 2024 Commencement ceremonies for both the College of Arts & Sciences and for the J. Whitney Bunting School of Business & Technology.

Under USG Policy 3.8.8, honorary degrees may be conferred by state universities like GCSU to persons of notable achievement in an academic field, the arts and letters, the professions, or public service. Dr. Cook's stellar academic achievements, as well as her notable public service as the first African-American woman in America and one of only four native Georgians to serve as a Governor of the Federal Reserve Board, make her a worthy candidate for this recognition.

2. <u>Mutual Aid Agreement: The Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Authority</u> (MARTA) Police Department and Georgia State University

Georgia State University seeks the Board of Regents permission to enter into a mutually beneficial emergency or special circumstances services agreement with the MARTA Police Department.

Memorandum of Understanding Extraterritorial Assistance

This Memorandum of Understanding (hereinafter referred to as "MOU") by and between Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Authority Act (MARTA) and Georgia State University, an institution within the University System of Georgia and the Board of Regents for the University System of Georgia becomes effective with the signatures of both parties. This mutual agreement is to remain effective until terminated by Georgia State University Police Department and the MARTA Police Department. The Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Authority Act (MARTA) Police Department and the Georgia State University Police Department are hereinafter collectively referred to as "Party" or "Parties." This agreement incorporates by reference standards contained in O.C.G.A. § 36-69-1 et seq., including subsequent amendments thereto.

I. Purpose

WHEREAS responses to emergency or special circumstances may exceed the immediate resources, skill, and equipment capacities of either Party's law enforcement agency, MARTA Police Department and the Georgia State University Police Department may request that the other Party provide certified police officers to assist in providing law enforcement services.

WHEREAS pursuant to O.C.G.A. § 36-69-1 et seq., Georgia State University Police Department is authorized to furnish assistance extraterritorially to the MARTA Police Department upon the approval of Board of Regents for the University System of Georgia and the President of Georgia State University with this MOU.

WHEREAS pursuant to O.C.G.A. § 36-69-1 et seq., MARTA Police Department is authorized to furnish assistance extraterritorially to Georgia State University Police Department with the approval of the President of Georgia State University, as well as the governing body for the local political subdivision or county sheriff, as applicable.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

- Purpose: The purpose of this MOU is to permit each Party to assign law enforcement officers to the other Party for law enforcement services within MARTA jurisdiction or on the Georgia State University campus as requested by the law enforcement agencies of the Parties. In accordance with O.C.G.A. § 36-69-8, nothing in this MOU shall be construed as creating a duty on the part of the Parties to respond to a request for assistance, or to stay at the scene of a local emergency for any length of time.
- 2. Requests: Requests for assistance may be made by the Chief of Police of MARTA

 Police Department or the Chief of Police of Georgia State University Police Department in
 a local emergency, in the prevention or detection of violations of any law, in the apprehension or
 arrest of any person who violates a criminal law of this state, or in any criminal case.
- 3. Authorities: The senior officer of the requesting Party shall be in command of the local emergency as to strategy, tactics, and overall direction of the operations.

- 4. Powers and Duties of Responding Personnel: In accordance with O.C.G.A. § 36-69-4, responding employees of either Party "shall have the same powers, duties, rights, privileges, and immunities as if they were performing their duties in the political subdivision or on the campus of the institution in which they are normally employed."
- 5. Responsibility for Expenses and Compensation of Employees: Parties responding to requests in conformance with this MOU shall pay any expense for furnishing of their own equipment, loss or damage to such equipment, and costs incurred in operation and maintenance of their equipment.

Responding Party shall compensate responding employees during the time they are rendering aid and defray actual travel expenses of employees. Compensation shall include compensation due to personal injury or death while employees are rendering aid. (O.C.G.A. § 36-69-5.)

II. Effective Date

1. Information Item: USG Capital Liability Management Plan

Marty Nance, Interim Associate Vice Chancellor for Finance, will outline the System's Capital Liability Management Plan for FY 2024-2028.

2. Approval Item: Request for Multi-Year Leasing Contract Value Authority

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board approve by resolution a request to the Georgia State Financing and Investment Commission (GSFIC) for contract value authority of \$10 million for multi-year office leases for FY 2025.

<u>Understandings</u>: Upon approval of the request by the Commission, the Office of Real Estate and Facilities will seek information from institutions concerning potential cost savings associated with conversion of existing annual rental agreements to multi-year rental agreements, and the potential for utilizing the multi-year option for new rental agreements.

<u>Background</u>: GSFIC must approve the proposed multi-year contract value authority for participating agencies for each fiscal year. Term of the contracts may not exceed 20 years. The State Properties Commission administers the multi-year leasing program. The Board of Regents' proposed contract value authority is incorporated in the Board of Regents Capital Liability Management Plan.

RESOLUTION REQUESTING ESTABLISHMENT OF MULTI-YEAR CONTRACT VALUE AUTHORITY

WHEREAS, at the general election held on November 6, 2012, voters of the State approved an amendment to the Georgia Constitution to authorize the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia ("BOR") to enter into lease and rental contracts exceeding one year;

WHEREAS FURTHER, the General Assembly amended O.C.G.A. 50-16-41 effective January 1, 2013 to authorize the BOR through the State Properties Commission to enter into lease and rental contract exceeding one year;

WHEREAS FURTHER, O.C.G.A. 50-16-41 provides that the Georgia State Financing and Investment Commission "each year, may establish a total multi-year contract value authority;"

WHEREAS FURTHER, O.C.G.A. 50-16-41 provides that "[n]o multi-year lease or rental agreement shall be entered into under the provisions of this Code section until the Georgia State Financing and Investment Commission has established the fiscal policies and multi-year contract value authority for the current and future fiscal years.;"

WHEREAS FURTHER, on December 12, 2012, the Georgia State Financing and Investment Commission established the fiscal policies required by O.C.G.A. 50-16-41;

WHEREAS FURTHER, the BOR has considered its expected needs for multi-year lease and rental agreements for fiscal year 2025, will comply with the aforementioned fiscal policies governing multi-year agreements, and determined to request the specific amount of contract value authority to be established for fiscal year 2025 in the amount of \$10,000,000.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

The BOR has considered its expected needs for multi-year lease and rental agreement for fiscal year 2025 and requests the Georgia State Financing and Investment Commission establish contract value authority for the BOR for fiscal year 2025 in the amount of \$10,000,000.

1. Guaranteed Energy Savings Performance Contract, University of Georgia

Sandra Lynn Neuse, Vice Chancellor for Real Estate and Facilities, will brief the Board on the University of Georgia's interest in investigating a new Guaranteed Energy Savings Performance Contract for their main campus in Athens.


2. <u>Authorization of Project No. BR-30-2409, Boggs Building Roof Replacement, Georgia Institute of Technology</u>

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board authorize Project No. BR-30-2409, Boggs Building Roof Replacement, Georgia Institute of Technology ("GIT"), with a total project budget of \$4,900,000 to be funded with institution funds.

<u>Understandings</u>: The Gilbert Hillhouse Boggs Building (the "Boggs Building") is a 154,397-square foot facility that houses instructional labs and research labs for the College of Sciences and College of Engineering. Replacement of the roof is necessary due to multiple instances of water intrusion into the occupiable spaces of the building and high measurements of moisture content in the overall roof system. GIT proposes to remove the existing roof systems, remove any obsolete roof penetrations, and install a thermoplastic polyolefin ("TPO") roof system with a thirty-year lifespan (the "Project").

The scope of the Project is complex and labor-intensive due to multiple factors, including poor construction and failing fasteners in one of the prior roof systems; the existence of numerous roof penetrations and four penthouse roofs in addition to the main roof; and the need to rework the parapet walls to ensure the flashing is properly installed. A crane set-up would also be required to access the roof.

The Project has an estimated construction cost of \$3,610,000 and is consistent with GIT's master plan. If authorized by the Board, GIT will proceed with design and construction of the Project in accordance with Board of Regents procedures.






3. <u>Authorization of Project No. BR-30-2408, Human Resources Building Renovation, Georgia Institute of Technology</u>

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board authorize Project No. BR-30-2408, Human Resources Building Renovation, Georgia Institute of Technology ("GIT"), with a total project budget of \$6,500,000 to be funded with institution funds.

<u>Understandings</u>: Located at 500 Tech Parkway and encompassing approximately 16,250 square feet, the two-story Human Resources Building (the "Building") is home to the Georgia Tech Human Resources Division that serves the institution's faculty, staff, and students. Approximately 1,500 square feet of space on the first floor of the Building was recently renovated to create a walk-up center where new employees can engage with GIT's Administrative Services Center staff regarding hiring and onboarding activities. GIT now proposes to renovate the remainder of the Building into a progressive workspace with individual workstations, shared work areas, and meeting and collaboration spaces totaling approximately 14,750 square feet (the "Project"). The Project is expected to increase staff capacity in the Building from 66 employees to over 125 employees, which would enable two remote work teams to return to the office and allow for the integration of approximately 30 staff members currently assigned to other spaces on campus. The vacated spaces would be repurposed to support the growth of GIT's Provost's unit and the Division of Lifelong Learning.

Other elements of the Project scope include accessibility upgrades to the Building's restrooms, improvements to the fire alarm system, and other minor repairs. The Project has an estimated construction cost of \$3,749,000 and is consistent with GIT's master plan. If authorized by the Board, the University System Office staff and GIT will proceed with design and construction of the Project in accordance with Board of Regents procedures.





4. <u>Authorization of Project No. BR-50-2402, Clarkston Parking Lot Improvements, Georgia State University</u>

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board authorize Project No. BR-50-2402, Clarkston Parking Lot Improvements, Georgia State University ("GSU"), with a total project budget of \$9,100,000 to be funded with institutional funds.

<u>Understandings</u>: Located approximately 10 miles east of downtown Atlanta, the Clarkston campus of GSU's Perimeter College opened as DeKalb College in 1964. The campus currently has eight paved parking lots for use by students, faculty, and staff. With pavement that is over 30 years old, numerous potholes, extensive cracking, and failing sections of curb and gutter, six of these parking lots need significant repair. Accordingly, GSU proposes to make needed improvements to Lots 1, 3, 5, 6, 7, and 8 (the "Lots"), including repaving, restriping, and curb and gutter replacement (the "Project"). The Project would also include the installation of new LED lighting and replacement of the underground raceways and conductors that serve the associated light poles. GSU would ensure that each Lot provides sufficient accessible parking and complies with ADA requirements.

The Project has an estimated construction cost of \$8,095,000 and is consistent with GSU's master plan. If authorized by the Board, GSU will proceed with design and construction of the Project in accordance with Board of Regents procedures. Board approval would also enable related efforts to remove and replace trees at the end of their expected life and the planting of additional trees to improve overall tree canopy coverage on and near the Lots, all of which would be funded from a grant from Trees Across Georgia.

Clarkston Campus Pkg. Lot Improvements






5. <u>Authorization of Project No. BR-50-2403, 55 Park Place Restroom Renovations, Georgia State University</u>

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board authorize Project No. BR-50-2403, 55 Park Place Restroom Renovations, Georgia State University ("GSU"), with a total project budget of \$6,200,000 to be funded with institutional funds.

<u>Understandings</u>: Located on the eastern side of Woodruff Park, the 19-story building located at 55 Park Place (the "Building") houses instructional classrooms, administrative spaces, and offices for GSU's Andrew Young School of Policy Studies and Robinson College of Business. GSU proposes to renovate the core men's and women's restrooms on nine (9) floors of the Building and upgrade the related plumbing infrastructure (the "Project"). In addition to making the existing restrooms accessible and improving their reliability, the Project scope includes creating an ADA-compliant unisex restroom on each floor of the Project.

The Project has an estimated construction cost of \$4,650,000 and is consistent with GSU's master plan. If authorized by the Board, GSU will proceed with design and construction of the Project in accordance with Board of Regents procedures.

6. <u>Authorization of Project No. BR-90-2403, Student Competition Teams Building, Marietta Campus, Kennesaw State University</u>

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board authorize Project No. BR-90-2403, Student Competition Teams Building, Kennesaw State University ("KSU"), with a total project budget of \$6,000,000 to be funded with institutional funds.


<u>Understandings</u>: KSU's Marietta campus has a long and robust history of student competition teams (the "Teams"), including over a dozen that are currently active. Through participation on the Teams, students enjoy opportunities for hands-on learning, foster lasting connections with their peers and with faculty, and can showcase their abilities on the local, national, and international stage.

Currently, the activities of the Teams are housed in the Wilder Communication Center, built in 1975, and the Student Competition Teams Building, constructed in 1983. Collectively totaling approximately 12,000 square feet, the layouts of these buildings no longer meet the growing demand for student activity space and do not provide for adequate faculty and staff supervision of team activities. Furthermore, neither facility has undergone extensive renovation or rehabilitation, and their mechanical and electrical systems are unable to support the continued needs of the Teams.

To address these concerns, KSU proposes to construct a new competition facility totaling approximately 12,000 square feet that includes a flexible space plan that improves student visibility and safety, faculty/staff supervisory program space, and infrastructure to support changing technology and equipment needs (the "Project"). Upon completion of the Project, the existing Student Competition Teams Building and the Wilder Communications Center would be reassigned for less intensive mechanical and electrical uses that support KSU's enrollment growth.

The Project has an estimated construction cost of \$4,800,000 and is consistent with KSU's master plan. If authorized by the Board, the University System Office staff and KSU will proceed with design and construction of the Project in accordance with Board of Regents procedures.

Student Competition Teams Building Marietta Campus April 2024






7. <u>Authorization of Project No. BR-90-2404, Chastain Pointe Building 100 Renovations, Kennesaw State University</u>

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board authorize Project No. BR-90-2404, Chastain Pointe Building 100 Renovations, Kennesaw State University ("KSU"), with a total project budget of \$6,300,000 to be funded with \$5,300,000 in institutional funds and \$1,000,000 in gifts and donations.

<u>Understandings</u>: KSU proposes to renovate approximately 19,000 square feet of existing space in Suites 101, 107, and 109 of Chastain Pointe Building 100 in Kennesaw (the "Project") to support the incremental relocation of program spaces for KSU's College of the Arts ("COTA"). The Project would involve converting approximately 9,100 square feet of the unrenovated Suite 109 into instructional spaces, including photography labs, a 3D lab, computer labs, and a classroom. Totaling approximately 2,700 square feet, Suite 107 would be renovated for office space for COTA faculty and staff. The relocation of these instructional and academic spaces to the Project from the Visual Arts Building would enable the existing classrooms and offices in the Visual Arts Building to be returned to KSU's space inventory in support of continued enrollment growth.

The final component of the Project would involve the creation of two gallery spaces within Suite 101, which totals approximately 7,200 square feet. The Athos Menaboni Pavilion would be a dedicated space for rotating KSU's Athos Menaboni Collection. Currently stored and periodically featured in the Bernard A. Zuckerman Museum of Art, the collection's relocation to the new space would free up storage space for the museum. With more space than the Wilson Building student gallery it would replace, the Emily Bourne Grigsby Gallery would also be able to accommodate student project exhibits for the COTA Capstone. KSU would plan to transition the vacated Wilson Building space into a prefunction and reception area for the Stillwell Theater.

The Project has an estimated construction cost of \$4,800,000 and is consistent with KSU's master plan. If authorized by the Board, the University System Office staff and KSU will proceed with the design and construction of the Project in accordance with Board of Regents procedures.




8. <u>Authorization of Project No. BR-69-2401, Theodore A. Wright Stadium Turf</u> Replacement, Savannah State University

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board authorize Project No. BR-69-2401, Theodore A. Wright Stadium Turf Replacement, Savannah State University ("SSU"), with a total project budget of \$1,033,600 to be funded through a grant award.

<u>Understandings</u>: SSU has been selected to receive a philanthropic grant award to make improvements to the field surface at Theodore A. Wright Stadium (the "Stadium"), the home of the SSU Tigers football team (the "Project"). The existing synthetic turf was installed in 2010 and has experienced significant wear and tear and drainage issues during heavy rains. The scope of the Project includes removing and disposing of the existing turf, grading and compacting the stone base, and installing a new synthetic turf system. The drainage issues with the field would be investigated, and upgrades to the existing water pump would be made as needed. In addition to providing an enhanced playing surface for the safety and performance of student-athletes, the new turf would offer increased longevity and durability for fans and attendees of Stadium events.

The Project is consistent with SSU's master plan. If authorized by the Board, SSU will proceed with design and construction of the Project in accordance with the conditions and terms of the grant and Board of Regents procedures. This process would involve coordinating with partners as necessitated by the conditions of the grant, ensuring a collaborative approach to vendor engagement. The grant would also include an additional \$100,000 in funding to cover expenses incurred by SSU for the management and oversight of the Project.

Theodore A. Wright Stadium Turf Replacement






9. <u>Amendments to Rental Agreements, 260 14th Street NW, Atlanta, Georgia Institute of Technology</u>

Recommended: That the Board authorize execution of an amendment to extend a rental agreement between Georgia Public Communications Commission, as Landlord, and the Board of Regents, as Tenant, for approximately 27,798 square feet of office space located on the fourth floor of the Georgia Public Broadcasting Building at 260 14th Street NW in Atlanta (the "Building") for the use and benefit of the Georgia Institute of Technology ("GIT"). This amendment would add fifteen (15) consecutive, one-year renewal term options to the lease, with the first additional extension covering the period from July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025, at a monthly rent of \$46,040.00 (\$552,480.00 annualized). Rental amounts would increase approximately 2.5% for each subsequent extension period through June 30, 2039.

Recommended further: That the Board authorize execution of an amendment to extend a rental agreement between the Landlord and Tenant for approximately 17,582 square feet of office space located on the third floor of the Building for the use and benefit of the GIT. This amendment would add fifteen (15) consecutive, one-year renewal term options to the lease, with the first additional extension covering the period from July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025, at a monthly rent of \$30,396.00 (\$364,752.00 annualized). Rental amounts would increase approximately 2.5% for each subsequent extension period through June 30, 2039.

<u>Understandings</u>: GIT has leased space at this location since 1997 when the Building was first constructed. The Building previously housed GIT's Advanced Technology Development Center and the Georgia Tech Research Institute's ("GTRI") Human Systems Integration Division. GIT's current space is utilized by GTRI's Electronic Systems Laboratory, with its Air National Guard Program performing broad spectrum applied research from the Building's third floor offices and the Applied Systems Engineering Division providing avionics systems integration and software and hardware training tools on the fourth floor. The amendments would allow GTRI to maintain its current footprint within the Building for up to fifteen (15) additional years.

All operating expenses associated with the lease would continue to be included in the base rental rate. Revenues generated from GTRI's sponsored work would pay all costs associated with the amended agreements.






10. <u>Amendment to Rental Agreement, Coastal Georgia Center, 305 Fahm Street, Savannah, Savannah State University</u>

Recommended: That the Board authorize the execution of an amendment to rental agreement between the Board of Regents, as Landlord, and the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Savannah, as Tenant, for approximately 34,734 square feet comprising the East Wing of the Coastal Georgia Center at 305 Fahm Street in Savannah, for the benefit of Savannah State University ("SSU"). This amendment would add five (5) consecutive, one-year, mutual extension options, with the first additional renewal term covering the period from June 1, 2024, through May 31, 2025, at a monthly rent of \$46,138.39 (\$553,660.68 annualized). Rental amounts would increase 3.0% for each subsequent renewal term through May 31, 2029.

<u>Understandings</u>: In May 2019, the Board approved a lease of space in the Coastal Georgia Center (the "Center") for use by the City of Savannah (the "City"). The Center is located in Savannah's Historic District and is adjacent to a seven-acre parcel owned by the City that is improved with the Savannah Visitor Center and Savannah History Museum. Constructed in 1988 and expanded around 1991, the two-story facility contains classrooms, offices, and meeting and event space. The City uses the East Wing to house back office administrative staff and as a public-facing payment center.

SSU would retain control over access to the Center's West Wing, where it offers graduate courses in Public Administration, Urban Studies and Planning, Social Work, and Business Administration. The City would continue to be responsible for payment of utilities, janitorial service, and pest control service for the East Wing, while maintenance of the Center would remain the responsibility of SSU.

11. <u>Amendment to Rental Agreement, 608 Massachusetts Avenue NE, Washington, District of Columbia, University of Georgia</u>

Recommended: That the Board authorize execution of an amendment to extend the rental agreement between The University of Georgia Foundation, as Landlord, and the Board of Regents, as Tenant, for improved property located at 608 Massachusetts Avenue NE, Washington, District of Columbia (the "Property") for the use and benefit of the University of Georgia ("UGA"). This amendment would add five (5) consecutive, one-year renewal term options to the lease, with the first additional extension covering the period from July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025, at a monthly rent of \$42,936.96 (\$515,243.52 annualized). Rental amounts would increase approximately 4.0% for each subsequent extension period through June 30, 2029.

<u>Understandings</u>: Following approval by the Board in September 2014, UGA began leasing the Property, commonly known as Delta Hall, to serve as the venue for UGA's Washington Semester Program. The facility also houses UGA's federal government relations office, the Honors in Washington Internship Program, and other academic initiatives. In May 2019, the Board approved a lease amendment that provided options to extend the agreement through June 2024.

Situated in the northern portion of the Capitol Hill Neighborhood, the Property is within walking distance of the United States Capitol and office buildings for the Senate and House of Representatives. Totaling approximately 15,283 square feet, the building on the Property is equipped with classrooms, offices, and conference areas on the first floor. The second and third levels contain nine (9) student suites that can accommodate up to 32 students, residential and office space for administrative staff and visiting faculty, study areas, lounges, kitchens, and other related amenities.

All operating expenses associated with the lease would continue to be included in the base rental rate. Rent payments would be sourced from institutional funds.

12. <u>Naming Removal and Naming, Mickey Dunn Baseball Stadium, Kennesaw State University</u>

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board approve the removal of the Stillwell name from the existing baseball stadium at Kennesaw State University ("KSU"); and


<u>Recommended further</u>: That the Board approve the naming of the renovated baseball stadium as "Mickey Dunn Baseball Stadium" in recognition of the philanthropy of Mr. Mickey Dunn.

<u>Understandings</u>: President Kathy Schwaig confirms that this naming conforms to KSU's naming guidelines and with the Board of Regents naming policy.

KSU's baseball stadium (the "Stadium") has served as the first and only home of the Owls baseball program since its original construction in 1984. In 1997, it was named "Stillwell Baseball Stadium" in honor of the late Fred E. Stillwell, an early and generous supporter of KSU and its athletic programs. The Stillwell family has expressed support for the renovation of the Stadium, which was authorized by the Board in September 2023, and for the proposed name change.

Mickey Dunn enjoyed a standout baseball career for the Southern Polytechnic State University ("SPSU") Hornets from 1978 to 1981, earning all-conference and all-district honors. In 2015, he was inducted into the SPSU Hall of Fame, a wing of the KSU Athletics Hall of Fame. Mr. Dunn has served for over three decades as President and Chief Executive Officer of ML Industries, Incorporated, a firm he founded in 1990 as a cut-and-sew operation for the private label apparel industry. The company has since diversified by offering automotive products and waste packaging solutions.

Mickey Dunn returned to KSU in May of 2018 to complete his Bachelor of Science degree in Integrative Studies. His gift of \$2,500,000 in support of KSU's baseball program was the largest one-time, single donation to the KSU Department of Athletics, which has since been increased with an additional gift of \$150,000.



13. Naming of Portia Holmes Shields Early Learning Center, Albany State University

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board approve the naming of the new early learning center to be constructed on Albany State University's ("ASU") East Campus as "Portia Holmes Shields Early Learning Center" in honor of former ASU President Portia Holmes Shields.

<u>Understandings</u>: President Marion Fedrick confirms that this naming conforms to ASU's naming guidelines and with the Board of Regents naming policy.

Dr. Shields earned a Bachelor of Science in Education from the District of Columbia Teachers College, a Master of Arts in Education from George Washington University, and a Doctor of Philosophy in Early Childhood and Elementary Education from the University of Maryland at College Park. She served as the director of medical and biomedical communications at the Howard University College of Medicine from 1989 to 1993, and as the dean of the Howard University School of Education from 1993 to 1996.

In 1996, Dr. Shields was named the seventh president of ASU, and its first female president. During the 10 years of her presidency, she led ASU through immense challenges and transformation. Under her leadership, the institution continued its recovery from the devastating Flint River floodwaters of 1994 and embarked on a remarkable rebuilding program that reaffirmed its commitment to excellence in education.

Following her retirement from ASU in 2005, Dr. Shields continued her trailblazing service to higher education. She served as the first female chief executive officer and chief academic officer at Concordia College Alabama, and as interim president of Tennessee State University from 2011 to 2012.

Authorized by the Board in May 2023, the new early learning center is currently in design and will encompass approximately 10,000 square feet that features classrooms, administrative offices, kitchen space, and an outdoor playground area.



14. Naming of Damir J. Kunovac Gate, Convocation Center, Georgia State University

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board approve the naming of Gate 2 at the Georgia State University ("GSU") Convocation Center located at 445 Capitol Avenue as "Damir J. Kunovac Gate" in recognition of the philanthropy of Mr. Damir J. Kunovac.


<u>Understandings</u>: President M. Brian Blake confirms that this naming conforms to GSU's naming guidelines and with the Board of Regents naming policy.

The GSU Convocation Center (the "Center") is a modern, multipurpose event facility with capacity for up to 8,000 guests. The Center opened in August 2022 and hosts first-year convocation, commencement ceremonies, major events including the 2023 inauguration of Governor Kemp, and athletic competitions. Located adjacent to the ticket office on the corner of Capitol Avenue SE and Fulton Street SW, Gate 2 is one of the three public gates of the Center.

Damir "DJ" Kunovac received his Bachelor of Science in Economics and Computer Science from GSU. In 2014, he co-founded Skubana, an enterprise resource planning system to aid people selling products on Amazon Marketplace. In 2021, Skubana was acquired by 3PL Central.

A longstanding advocate of GSU Athletics, Mr. Kunovac is a longtime football season ticket holder and member of the Panther Athletic Club. To demonstrate his commitment to and support for GSU and its athletics programs, he has given \$100,000 to the Georgia State University Foundation.

15. Naming of David E. Ralston Hall, Blue Ridge Campus, University of North Georgia

<u>Recommended</u>: That the Board approve the naming of the new academic building under construction on the University of North Georgia's ("UNG") campus in Blue Ridge as "David E. Ralston Hall" in honor of the late Speaker of the Georgia House of Representatives, David E. Ralston.

<u>Understandings</u>: President Michael Shannon confirms that this naming conforms to UNG's naming guidelines and with the Board of Regents naming policy.

Born in Ellijay, Georgia, Speaker Ralston graduated from Gilmer County High School and North Georgia College. He earned his law degree from the University of Georgia and practiced law in Blue Ridge for many years. From 1992 to 1998, he served as a member of the Georgia Senate, and was the Republican nominee for attorney general of Georgia in 1998. In 2002, he was elected to the Georgia House of Representatives to represent the 7th District and its constituents in Fannin, Gilmer, and Dawson Counties. In January 2010, he began serving as the 73rd Speaker of the Georgia House, a position he held until his untimely death in November 2022.

Speaker Ralston was a staunch advocate for the north Georgia region, and the second-longest serving Speaker of the Georgia House of Representatives. He played a pivotal role in shaping legislation that has had a lasting positive impact by promoting economic development and enhancing the overall well-being of Georgians. His visionary leadership was instrumental in expanding access to mental health resources and championing rural economic development.

Authorized by the Board in May 2022, the new building is currently under construction with an expected completion in the spring of 2025. Totaling approximately 22,300 square feet, the building will house classrooms, nursing simulation labs, offices, and a multipurpose room.
