MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA HELD AT Atlanta Georgia April 14-15, 2009

CALL TO ORDER

The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia met on Tuesday, April 14, 2009, and Wednesday, April 15, 2009, in the Board Room, 270 Washington St., S.W. The Chair of the Board, Regent Richard L. Tucker, called the meeting to order at approximately 1:00 p.m. on Tuesday, April 14, 2009, and again at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday, April 15, 2009. Present on Tuesday and Wednesday, in addition to Chair Tucker, were Vice Chair Robert F. Hatcher and Regents James A. Bishop, Kenneth R. Bernard, Jr., Hugh A. Carter, Jr., William H. Cleveland, Felton Jenkins, W. Mansfield Jennings, Jr., James R. Jolly, Elridge W. McMillan, Donald M. Leebern, Jr., William H. NeSmith, Jr., Doreen Stiles Poitevint, Willis J. Potts, Jr., Kessell D. Stelling, Jr., Benjamin Tarbutton, III, and Allan Vigil. Regent Wanda Yancey Rodwell requested and received permission to be absent on Tuesday, April 14, 2009, and Wednesday, April 15, 2009.

INVOCATION

The invocation was given on each day by Regent Doreen Stiles Poitevint.

SAFETY BRIEFING

The safety briefing was given on each day by Chief Bruce Holmes.

ATTENDANCE REPORT

The attendance report was given on each day by the Secretary to the Board.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of the Board of Regents meeting held on March 17, 2009, were unanimously approved.

INTRODUCTION OF NEW PRESIDENT: GEORGIA INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

Chancellor Erroll B. Davis, Jr., after thanking Dr. Gary Schuster for outstanding service as Interim President, introduced Dr. G.P. "Bud" Peterson, who began his appointment as the eleventh President of the Georgia Institute of Technology on April 1, 2009. Dr. Peterson's academic career has been spent at three institutions, not counting a one-year assignment with the National Science Foundation in 1993-94. He worked for 19 years at Texas A&M, where he served as head of the Department of Mechanical Engineering for three years (1993-96) and executive associate dean of

engineering for four years (1996-2000). Dr. Peterson also had the title of associate vice chancellor for the Texas A&M University System from 1996-2000. He was recruited to Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, New York, as provost in July, 2000. Peterson served in this capacity until 2006 when he was appointed as the Chancellor of the University of Colorado at Boulder. Following his introduction, President Peterson gave brief remarks, congratulated Interim President Gary Schuster for a job well done and thanked the Board and Chancellor for the opportunity to serve Georgia Institute of Technology and the University System of Georgia.

RECOGNITION OF GUESTS

Chancellor Erroll B. Davis, Jr. recognized Mr. Juan Llanes, a Gainesville State College student, who was recently named to *USA Today's* 2009 All-USA 2-Year Academic All-Star Team. Mr. Llanes is studying computer science and business administration.

CHANCELLOR'S REPORT

In his report, Chancellor Erroll B. Davis, Jr., offered well-deserved thanks for the tremendous amount of work done by members of the Board and by members of the Chancellor's staff during the recent legislative session. The Chancellor noted that this was a very challenging session, with tight budgets and proposed legislation demanding the Board's full attention. The Chancellor noted in particular the hard work of Mr. Tom Daniel, Ms. Usha Ramachandran, Ms. Amanda Seals, Ms. Linda Daniels, and all those in the institutional and Board budget, fiscal affairs, facilities and external relations offices. The Chancellor also thanked the members of the Board for their very helpful work during the legislative session.

The Chancellor also offered extended remarks of thanks and good wishes to three departing University System Office staff members. He thanked and offered congratulations to Dr. Cathie Mayes Hudson on her retirement and thanked and offered good wishes to Dr. Jennifer Fairchild-Pierce and Mr. Ronald B. Stark, who will soon be beginning new appointments at the Georgia Institute of Technology and the King Abdulla University of Science and Technology, respectively.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE: FINANCE AND BUSINESS OPERATIONS

The Finance and Business Operations Committee, meeting as the Committee of the Whole, met on Tuesday, April 14, 2009, at approximately 1:08 p.m. in the Board Room. Committee members in attendance included all Regents, with the exception of Regent Rodwell. Chair Willis J. Potts, Jr., reported to the Board that the Committee reviewed five items, each of which required action.

In addition to Chair Potts, the discussion was led by the Board's Vice Chancellor for Fiscal Affairs and Treasurer, Ms. Usha Ramachandran, and Columbus State University President Timothy S. Mescon, who brief the committee on actions taken by Columbus State University to reduce costs and increase efficiencies. With motion properly made, seconded, and unanimously adopted, the Board approved and authorized the following:

1. Waiver of Board Policies

The Board waived Policies 704.011 ("Definitions"), 704.012 ("Guaranteed Tuition Plan"), and 704.021 ("Mandatory Student Fees") for purposes of the Board's actions on the Fiscal Year 2010 budget measures.

2. FY 2010 Budget Allocations

The Board approved the budget allocations as recommended by the committee. The budget allocations are attached to these minutes as Appendices I-A through I-D.

3. <u>Continuation of Special Institutional Fee</u>

The Board determined that all University System institutions would continue to charge the special institutional fee of \$100, \$75, and \$50, for research universities, comprehensive universities, and state and two-year colleges, respectively.

4. <u>FY 2010 Tuition</u>

The Board approved Fiscal Year 2010 tuition levels for all institutions, as recommended by the committee. The tuition report is attached to these minutes as Appendices II-A and II-B.

5. FY 2010 Mandatory Student Fees

The Board approved Fiscal Year 2010 mandatory student fees for all institutions, as recommended by the committee. The mandatory student fee report is attached to these minutes as Appendix III.

The committee meeting adjourned at approximately 2:19 p.m.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE: STRATEGIC PLANNING

Under the leadership of Chair Robert F. Hatcher, the Strategic Planning Committee met as a Committee of the Whole at approximately 10:10 a.m. on Wednesday, April 15, 2009. All Regents were present with the exception of Regent Rodwell. Associate Vice Chancellor Shelley Nickel and Mr. Jack Sprott, Executive Director of the McPherson Planning Local Redevelopment Authority, presented an update on the status of the base closure and redevelopment planning.

6. <u>Establishment of a Bachelor of Applied Science with a major in Homeland</u> <u>Security/Emergency Management, Clayton State University</u>

The Board approved the request of President Thomas K. Harden that Clayton State University be authorized to establish a Bachelor of Applied Science with a major in Homeland Security/Emergency Management, effective April 15, 2009.

7. <u>Establishment of a Master of Science in Information and Instructional Design</u>, <u>Southern Polytechnic State University</u>

9. <u>Named Faculty Positions</u>

Administrative and academic appointments were reviewed by the Chair of the Committee on Academic Affairs. A list of all such appointments is on file and is available for inspection in the Board's Office of Academic Affairs.

10. <u>Information Item: Follow-up Report on Diversity Summit</u>

A monthly progress report on the University System 2009 Diversity Summit was provided to the committee by the Director of Academic Program Coordination, Dr. Marci M. Middleton. The presentation included information concerning proposed program sessions and system data supporting specific foci and themes.

11. Information Item: Nursing Update

Dr. Dara O'Neill of the Board's Center for Healthcare Workforce provided a follow-up report to the introductory presentation given at the November, 2008 Board meeting. The presentation included information concerning additional funding for nursing programs in the University System.

The committee meeting adjourned at approximately 3:25 p.m.

COMMITTEE ON MEDICAL EDUCATION EXPANSION

The Committee on Medical Education Expansion met on Wednesday, April 15, 2009, at approximately 8:31 a.m. in room 5158. Committee members in attendance were Chair James A. Bishop and Regents Kenneth R. Bernard, Jr., Felton Jenkins, Donald M. Leebern, Jr., William H. NeSmith, Jr., Willis J. Potts, Jr., and Kessel Stelling, Jr. Chairman Richard L. Tucker and Chancellor Erroll B. Davis were also in attendance. Chair Bishop reported to the Board that the Committee reviewed four information items, none of which required action. With motion properly made, seconded, and unanimously adopted, the Board accepted the committee's report of the following:

1. <u>Information Item: Update on Facility Renovations for MCG/UGA Medical</u> <u>Education Partnership Campus</u>

Until the Navy School property in Athens becomes available to the University of Georgia ("UGA"), operations of the MCG/UGA Medical Partnership Campus will take place on property adjacent to the main UGA campus. This property, and the building located on it will require substantial renovations and refitting to ensure that it can effectively be used for medical education. Mr. Timothy Burgess, Senior Vice President for Finance and Administration at the University of Georgia, provided an update to committee on the current state of these renovations.

2. <u>Information Item: Final Preparation for LCME Site Visit</u>

The Liaison Committee on Medical Education ("LCME") will make its official site visit to the Medical College of Georgia ("MCG"), from April 19 - 21, 2009, to review the readiness of the MCG/UGA Medical Partnership Campus to provide four years of medical student education in Athens. Although the new campus represents an academic partnership between MCG and the University of Georgia ("UGA"), the LCME must provide approval to the MCG School of Medicine to expand its accreditation to include the new campus. Dr. Douglas Miller, Dean of the School of Medicine at the Medical College of Georgia; Dr. Arnett Mace, Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs at the University of Georgia; and Dr. Barbara Schuster, Dean of the MCG/UGA Medical Partnership Campus in Athens, briefed the committee of the state of final preparations for this visit.

3. <u>Information Item: Update on Developments with Medical Education Programs at</u> <u>Partnership Campus</u>

Dr. Barbara Schuster, Dean of the MCG/UGA Medical Partnership Campus in Athens, provided the committee with an update on developments to begin medical education at the MCG/UGA Medical Partnership Campus in Athens. Information provided to the committee covered ongoing progress with recruitment, facilities and equipment, curriculum development, student services, admissions, and other items.

4. Information Item: Status of Developments with MCG Clinical Campuses

The complete strategy for expansion of medical education within the University System, as adopted by the Board of Regents, requires development of additional training capacity in locations across Georgia. This includes efforts to develop medical education capacity in Augusta, Southeast and Southwest Georgia, with consideration for development in other parts of the state as needed. Dr. Douglas Miller, Dean of the School of Medicine at the Medical College of Georgia, informed the committee of efforts and progress made in developing further education capacity in the Augusta, Southeast and Southwest areas.

The committee meeting adjourned at approximately 9:15 a.m.

714 Identity Theft Program

The University System of Georgia shall have a program and policies designed to protect against identity theft and to safeguard personal and/or financial information maintained by the University System and its institutions and offices. The program shall comply with all federal and Georgia credit reporting and electronic transaction laws, shall be reviewed at least annually for effectiveness and legal compliance, and shall be widely distributed.

2. <u>Applications for Review</u>

At approximately 3:31 p.m. on Tuesday, April 14, 2009, Chair Kenneth R. Bernard, Jr. called for an executive session for the purpose of discussing personnel matters and academic records of students. 1. <u>Appointment of Architectural Firm, Project No. J-153, Library Renovation and</u> <u>Speaker Tom Murphy Office, University of West Georgia</u>

The Board appointed the first-named architectural firm listed below for the identified project and authorized the execution of a contract with the identified firm. In the event that it is not possible to execute a contract with the top-ranked firm, the Board authorized the Vice Chancellor for Facilities to execute a contract with the other listed firms in rank order.

Following public advertisement, a qualifications-based selection process was held in accordance with Board of Regents procedures. The following recommendation was made:

Project J-153, Library Renovation and Speaker Tom Murphy Office, University of West Georgia

Project Description: The project was authorized by the Board in November 2008. The library, built in the 1960's, had an addition in 1980 and totals 40,160 square feet.

According to most recent standards for library planning, preliminary studies indicates major deficiencies exist for seating and studying space. To serve strategic priority needs of UWG, the library renovation will include expanding seating and studying space and addition of information commons.

The project includes partial renovation of the ground floor (basement) to accommodate materials that are not part of the browsing collection, and renovation of the main floor including renovation to seating and studying space, and the reproduction of the Speaker Tom Murphy office for display of his political collections and memorabilia.

The project design will be funded from FY 2009B General Obligation Bonds.

The Board accepted a gift of approximately 13.20 acres of improved real property located at 7 Solar Circle, Newnan, from Coweta County (the "County") for the use and benefit of the University of West Georgia ("UWG"), subject to the completion of an environmental assessment of the real property indicating no significant problems or, if environmental problems are indicated, said problems can be mitigated before the real property is acquired.

Acquisition of this real property is consistent with the Board's strategic plan for access and instruction.

This real property is improved with three structures built in 1990. An approximately 11,400-square-foot steel frame, brick veneer, building is used as the main academic building is in generally good condition. An approximately 3,200-square-foot concrete masonry building is in generally good condition, but will require roof replacement. An approximately 2,400-square-foot pre-engineered steel building is in generally good condition.

If acquired the facility will continue to be used by UWG as its Newnan Center.

An appraisal conducted by Hugh B. Bass, Sr., MAI, Carrollton, in January 2009 values the property at \$2,200,000.

There are no restrictions on the gift. There is a reversion if the property is no longer used for academic instruction. There are no known restrictions or adverse easements on the real property.

3. <u>Gift of Real Property, 1171 Astondale Road, Bishop, University of Georgia</u>

The Board accepted a gift of approximately 109.108 acres of improved real property located at 1171 Astondale Road, Bishop, from the University of Georgia Athletic Association, Inc. (the "Association") for the use and benefit of the University of Georgia, subject to the completion of an environmental assessment of the real property indicating no significant problems or, if environmental problems are indicated, said problems are mitigated before the real property is acquired. The Board directed that the rental agreement with the Association be amended to include this real property.

Acquisition of this real property is consistent with the Association master plan as a strategic property acquisition to support university athletic programs. This property will serve the needs of the equestrian sports program.

This real property is a horse farm formerly known as the High Point Equestrian Center. The real property is improved with two main buildings including a 17,000-square-foot covered arena and a 9,325-square-foot 24-stall horse barn with second story office/apartment area. There are also three smaller structures including a 6-stall stable, a 500-square-foot equipment shed and a 1,800-square-

foot hay barn. All of these structures are in generally good condition. The property is also improved with a lighted outdoor jumping arena.

An appraisal conducted by Robert A. Jaeger, MAI, Gainesville in May 2008 values the property at \$2,560,000.

There are no restrictions on the gift and no known reversions, restrictions, or adverse easements on the real property.

4. Modification of Rental Agreement, Student Housing, Georgia Gwinnett College

The Board authorized the modification of the rental agreement between the GGC Foundation, LLC, (the "LLC"), Landlord, and the Board of Regents, Tenant, for student housing facilities containing 1029 beds and site amenities to commence on the first day of the first month after the LLC obtains a certificate of occupancy for 1,029 student housing beds but not earlier than August 1, 2010 and end the following June 30 at a rent not to exceed \$260,000, with an option to renew for one year at a rent not to exceed \$5,645,000, with a further option to renew for one year at a rent not to exceed \$6,166,000, with further options to renew on a year-to-year basis for up to 27 consecutive one-year periods (the total not to exceed 30 years from the date the LLC obtains a certificate of occupancy for all 1,029 student housing beds), with rent increasing no more than 3% for each further option period exercised.

In August 2008, the Board approved a rental agreement for partial occupancy of 204 student housing beds for Fall Semester, 2009, with all 1,029 student housing beds available for Fall Semester, 2010. Because of economic conditions the LLC is not able to provide partial occupancy for Fall Semester, 2009. This modification contemplates commencement of the rental agreement on occupancy of the entire 1,029 student housing beds for Fall Semester, 2010.

5. <u>Ground Lease and Rental Agreement, Student Housing, Armstrong Atlantic State</u> <u>University</u>

The Board declared an approximately 3.46 acre tract of unimproved real property on the campus of Armstrong Atlantic State University ("AASU") to be no longer advantageously useful to AASU or other units of the University System of Georgia but only to the extent and for the purpose of allowing this real property to be ground leased to the AASU Windward Commons, LLC, (the "LLC") for the purpose of providing student housing facilities containing approximately 569 student housing beds and site amenities.

The Board also authorized the execution of a ground lease, including necessary access, use, and construction easements and encroachments, between the Board of Regents, Lessor, and the LLC, Lessee, for the above-referenced approximately 3.46 acres of real property on the campus of AASU for a period not to exceed 32 years (not to exceed 30 years from the date the LLC obtains a certificate of occupancy for all 569 student housing beds and providing a construction period of not more than two years), with an option to renew for up to an additional five years should there be debt outstanding at the end of the original ground lease term, for the purpose of providing student housing facilities containing approximately 569 student housing beds and site amenities.

The Board also authorized the execution of a rental agreement between the LLC, Landlord, and the Board of Regents, Tenant, for the above-referenced student housing facilities and site amenities for the period commencing on the first day of the first month after the LLC obtains a certificate of occupancy for all 569 student housing beds, but not earlier than August 1, 2010, and ending the

following June 30 at a rent not to exceed \$850,000, with an option to renew for one year at a rent not to exceed \$2,100,000, with further options to renew on a year-to-year basis for up to 28 consecutive one-year periods (the total not to exceed 30 years from the date the LLC obtains a certificate of occupancy for all 569 student housing beds), with rent increasing no more than 3% for each further option period exercised.

The Board also authorized the execution of a site license between the LLC, Licensee, and the Board of Regents, to allow early site access to mobilize and install erosion control, commence site work including clearing and grading, and relocate utilities.

The anticipated schedule is for the LLC to have a bond closing by the end of June, 2009 and to commence construction immediately thereafter. Construction is expected to be complete in July, 2010, in order to allow occupancy by AASU at the beginning of Fall Semester, 2010.

At the end of the term of the ground lease, the real property, all improvements, and any accumulated capital reserves will become the property of the Board of Regents.

6. <u>Ground Lease and Rental Agreement Amendments, Student Housing and Parking,</u> <u>and Ground Lease and Rental Agreement, Student Housing, University of Georgia</u>

The Board authorized the execution of an amendment to the ground lease between the Board of Regents, Lessor, and UGAREF East Campus Housing, LLC (the "Housing LLC") to decrease the parcel size for student housing to approximately 7.9722 acres, and further authorized the execution of an amendment to the rental agreement between the Housing LLC, Landlord, and the Board of Regents, Tenant, to decrease the parcel size for student housing to approximately 7.9722 acres.

The Board also authorized the execution of an amendment to the ground lease between the Board of Regents, Lessor, and the Housing LLC to decrease the parcel size for the parking deck to approximately 3.74 acres, and authorized the execution of an amendment to the rental agreement between the Housing LLC, Landlord, and the Board of Regents, Tenant, to decrease the parcel size for the parking deck to approximately 3.74 acres.

The Board declared an approximately 1.76 acre tract of unimproved real property on the campus of the University of Georgia ("UGA"), to be no longer advantageously useful to UGA or other units of the University System of Georgia, but only to the extent and for the purpose of allowing this real property to be ground leased to the UGAREF East Campus Housing Phase II, LLC, (the "Phase II LLC") for the purpose of providing student housing facilities containing approximately 550 student housing beds and site amenities.

The Board authorized the execution of a ground lease, including necessary access, use, and construction easements and encroachments, between the Board of Regents, Lessor, and the Phase II

LLC, Lessee, for the above-referenced approximately 1.76 acres of real property on the campus of UGA for a period not to exceed 32 years (not to exceed 30 years from the date the Phase II LLC obtains a certificate of occupancy for all 550 student housing beds and providing a construction period of not more than two years), with an option to renew for up to an additional five years should there be debt outstanding at the end of the original ground lease term, for the purpose of providing student housing facilities containing approximately 550 student housing beds and site amenities.

The Board also authorized the execution of a rental agreement between the Phase II LLC, Landlord, and the Board of Regents, Tenant, for the above-referenced student housing facilities and site amenities for the period commencing on the day after the Phase II LLC obtains a certificate of occupancy for all 550 student housing beds, but not earlier than July 1, 2010, and ending the following June 30 at a rent not to exceed \$4,150,000, with an option to renew on a year-to-year basis for up to 29 consecutive one-year periods (the last such period ending no later than June 30, 2040), with rent increasing no more than 1% for each option period exercised.

The Board approved a ground lease for student housing in October 2001, and modified this ground lease in March 2002 and October 2002. The amendment to this agreement will decrease the parcel size to the real property the student housing occupies. The Board approved a rental agreement for 1,200 beds of student housing in October 2002. The amendment to this agreement will not change the consideration for the student housing, but will conform the rental agreement to the ground lease parcel.

The Board approved a ground lease for a parking deck in October 2001, and modified this ground lease in March 2002 and October 2002. The amendment to this agreement will decrease the parcel size to the real property the parking deck occupies. The Board approved a rental agreement for the parking deck in May 2002, and modified the rental agreement in October 2002. The amendment to this agreement will not change the consideration for the parking deck, but will conform the rental agreement to the ground lease parcel.

The anticipated schedule is for the Phase II LLC to have a bond closing by the end of May 2009 and commence construction immediately thereafter. Construction is expected to be complete in July 2010 to allow occupancy by UGA at the beginning of fall semester 2010.

At the end of the term of the ground lease, the real property, all improvements, and any accumulated capital reserves will become the property of the Board of Regents.

7. <u>Demolition of Houses, Grounds Building, Pool, Pool-house, and Tennis Courts,</u> <u>Dublin Campus, Middle Georgia College</u>

The Board declared twelve houses, the grounds building, the pool, the pool-house, the utility building and the tennis courts on the Dublin Campus of Middle Georgia College ("MGC"), Dublin,

Georgia, to be no longer advantageously useful to MGC or other units of the University System of Georgia and authorize demolition and removal of these buildings, and requested the Governor to issue an Executive Order authorizing the demolition and removal of these buildings from the campus of MGC. The Board also required that demolition and removal of these buildings be subject to adequate mitigation of all adverse environmental impacts.

In 2001, the Board acquired a portion of the Carl Vinson VA Medical Center property. This property includes seven brick faced and five wood-sided houses built between 1941 and 1949 (approximately 1,275 square feet each), and the pool, the pool-house, the tennis courts, and the utility building all built between 1944 and 1950. The grounds building, built in 1962 on the original Dublin Center, is approximately 2,000 square feet.

The removal of all these buildings is in accordance with the MGC Master Plan. The site is part of expansion of the MGC's campus green space and proposed future recreational space.

All these buildings are eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places. MGC is adhering to the requirements of the Georgia Environmental Policy Act ("GEPA") and State Stewardship review, and is working with the Georgia Historic Preservation Division to appropriately mitigate any adverse impact of demolition.

A hazardous materials survey and assessment has been conducted and has identified recommendations for the proper management and disposal of asbestos-containing materials, lead based paint, and other hazardous materials during demolition to ensure compliance with environmental regulations.

8. <u>Non-exclusive Easement, Athens-Clarke County, University of Georgia</u>

The Board declared approximately 1.35 acres of unimproved real property located between College Station Road and the North Oconee River on the campus of the University of Georgia ("UGA"), to be no longer advantageously useful to UGA or other units of the University System of Georgia, but only to the extent and for the purpose of granting a non-exclusive easement to Athens-Clarke County (the "ACC") for use to construct, operate and maintain a bridge and public roadway, and authorized the execution of a non-exclusive easement with the ACC for the above-referenced tract of real property.

The Board also declared an approximately 0.1642 acre tract of unimproved real property located between College Station Road and the North Oconee River on the campus of UGA to be no longer advantageously useful to UGA or other units of the University System of Georgia, but only to the extent and for the purpose of granting a temporary construction easement to the ACC for construction and installation of a bridge and public roadway. The Board also authorized the execution of a temporary construction easement with the ACC for the above-referenced tract of real property.

In August, 2008, the Board was informed of a potential easement to the ACC to build a bridge across the North Oconee River. This easement will provide ACC access to construct and operate a new wastewater treatment plant. The existing wastewater treatment plant will subsequently undergo a full regulatory de-commissioning. Consideration for this easement is a five year option for the Board to acquire, via like size property exchange, the 24.67 acre site of the de-commissioned wastewater treatment plant. Future Board action will be required for these property exchanges. The 12.573 acres transferred to ACC that was approved by the Board in June, 2006, is included in the exchange acreage. Additional consideration is the increased capacity and modern technology of the new wastewater treatment plant. The proposed bridge and access road will also provide access to property owned by the University of Georgia Real Estate Foundation that is being held for future use by UGA.

9. <u>Authorization of Projects Funded by American Recovery and Reinvestment Act</u>

The Board authorized a project to be funded by American Recovery and Reinvestment Act.

This approval is for projects to be presented to the Committee. Should American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (the "ARRA") funding not be available, these projects will not proceed. Should full ARRA funding not be obtained, the projects will be reprogrammed within available funding, or supplemental funding will be provided. If alternative funding is provided to supplement the ARRA funding then further Board authorization will be obtained. This project is included in the campus' Capital Implementation Plan (the "CIP"), however it is not currently contemplated for State General Obligation Bond funding within the rolling six year CIP.

9a. <u>Authorization of Project No. BR-40-0902, Animal Care Facility Expansion, Medical</u> <u>College of Georgia</u>

The Board authorized Project No. BR-40-0902, Animal Care Facility Expansion, Medical College of Georgia ("MCG"), with a total project budget of \$15,185,000 to be funded from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act.

The project will add approximately 43,900 square feet and renovate approximately 1,600 square feet of interior spaces and cage washing area of the Gracewood animal research facility. MCG will proceed with applying for the federal grants through the National Institute of Health to fund the project. If funding is received, the University System Office staff and MCG will proceed with design and construction of the project in accordance with Board of Regents procedures.

10. Information Item: Revision of Board Policy

Associate Vice Chancellor Peter J. Hickey, Assistant Vice Chancellor Sandra L. Neuse, Executive Director for Real Estate Ventures Marty Nance, and Director of Safety and Security G. Bruce Holmes provided an update on proposed revisions to Board Policy. Regent Jenkins requested a follow-up report on current student housing with outstanding State General Obligation Bonds.

The committee meeting adjourned at approximately 3:50 p.m.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

There was none.

NEW BUSINESS

Chair Tucker asked Regent James A. Bishop, Chair of the University System of Georgia Foundation, Inc., to give the Board an update on the Regents' Awards for Excellence in Education Celebration on March 28, 2009, at the Marriott Marquis Atlanta. Chair Bishop reported that over \$1 million was raised in support of faculty grants, student scholarships, and other awards. Regent Bishop introduced a video prepared for the Board which highlighted individual scholarship recipients and the meaningful impact the Regents Scholarships have had on the students' educational careers. Regent Bishop expressed his sincere appreciation to all those who made the gala such an outstanding success.

Chair Richard L. Tucker announced that Regents Tarbutton, Jenkins, and Stelling had agreed to serve as the Regents' Nominating Committee for 2009-10, with Regent Tarbutton serving as chair of the committee.

Chair Richard L. Tucker also announced that, in addition to Chair Tucker, Regents Bishop, Cleveland, Jennings, Leebern, Stelling and Tarbutton had agreed to serve on the Presidential Search Committee for the Medical College of Georgia, with Regent Bishop serving as chair of the committee.

The Board approved the requests of Presidents Michael F. Adams, Thomas Z. Jones and Lisa A. Rossbacher, that the University of Georgia, Armstrong Atlantic State University, and Southern Polytechnic State University be authorized to award honorary degrees to Ms. Mary Virginia Terry, Mr. Philip Solomons, and Mr. Robert B. Ormsby, Jr., respectively.

PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

The Secretary to the Board announced that the next regular meeting of the Board is scheduled for May 12-13, 2009, in Atlanta.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

At approximately 11:40 a.m. on Wednesday, April 15, 2009, Chair Richard L. Tucker called for an executive session for the purpose of discussing personnel matters. With motion properly made and variously seconded, the Regents who were present voted unanimously to go into executive session. Those Regents are as listed above. University System of Georgia staff members who were also present for a portion of the executive session included Chancellor Erroll B. Davis Jr., the Vice Chancellor for Legal Affairs, J. Burns Newsome, the Chief Operating Officer, Robert E. Watts, and the Chief Academic Officer & Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, Susan Herbst.

In accordance with H.B. 278, Section 3 (amending O.C.G.A. § 50-14-4), an affidavit regarding this executive session is on file with the Office of the Secretary to the Board.

At approximately 3:50 p.m., Chair Tucker reconvened the Board meeting in its regular session and announced that no actions were taken during the executive session. On motion properly made and seconded in open session, the Board reappointed the presidents of all University System institutions, with the exceptions of Presidents Thomas Z. Jones of Armstrong Atlantic State University, Bruce F. Grube of Georgia Southern University, and Daniel W. Rahn of The Medical College of Georgia, each of whom has submitted his resignation.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, the meeting was adjourned at approximately 3:55 p.m. on Wednesday, April 15, 2009.

APPENDIX IV TO THE MINUTES OF THE APRIL 14-15, 2009 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA ATLANTA, GEORGIA

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA

WHEREAS, Fort McPherson, a 488-acre U.S. Army base in Southwest Atlanta, is scheduled to close by September 2011, and is undergoing a planning process for disposition and redevelopment led by the McPherson Planning Local Redevelopment Agency (MPLRA); and

WHEREAS, due to its size, characteristics, and uniquely strategic location on the MARTA rail line between Downtown Atlanta and Hartsfield Jackson International Airport, the redevelopment of Fort McPherson represents a key economic development opportunity for the State of Georgia and greater Atlanta; and

WHEREAS, Governor Sonny Perdue tapped the University System of Georgia to lead the state efforts in the creation of a world-class research park at Fort McPherson to provide "significant economic development for the State of Georgia for decades to come;" and

WHEREAS, Georgia has an opportunity to capitalize on our broad but dispersed base of biological and health science knowledge base by catalyzing growth in our native enterprises and integrating new commerce in what the Georgia Research Alliance has envisioned as "The Crossroads of Global Health," which could be anchored in a research park at Fort McPherson; and

WHEREAS, the MPLRA has approved a redevelopment plan that recommends a high-quality urban mixed-use redevelopment at Fort McPherson with its core developed as an "employment generator" as an anchor, and has identified the State of Georgia/University System of Georgia (USG) research park as the potential target of an Economic Development Conveyance of a significant portion of the site at zero or nominal cost; and

WHEREAS, Sasaki Associates and Meadows & Affiliates have produced reports recommending that the USG pursue the research park concept but call for further study to refine the development concept and vision, and recommend the early establishment of a significant, branded anchor tenant;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That to ideally implement USG Strategic Goal Three, which calls for increasing the System's participation in research and economic development to the benefit of a global Georgia, the Board of Regents commits to the goal of pursuing the development and stewardship of a research park at Fort McPherson with a target to acquire land

and commence development as soon as practicable following the closure in September 2011; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Board of Regents commits to achieving this goal through a strategic partnership between 1) the State of Georgia, 2) the USG, 3) the Georgia Research Alliance, and 4) a research park anchor tenant; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Board of Regents hereby charges and instructs the Chancellor of the University System of Georgia and the presidents of the four USG Research Universities to work together and with other community and industry stakeholders to further develop and refine strategies for the physical planning and development, financial feasibility and approach, and industry sector focus of the research park; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Board of Regents hereby charges and instructs the Chancellor of the University System of Georgia to work with all appropriate stakeholders to identify, engage, and secure commitments from a suitable world-class anchor tenant to enhance the park's development and enterprise; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Board acknowledges that the dynamic and evolving nature of the base closure and redevelopment process will require a commitment to fund and undertake further strategic and implementation planning in FY2010 and FY2011 to optimize the outcomes for the USG and the state; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Board recognizes the likely need for a significant investment of state funds beginning in FY2012 to properly seed the development of a successful research park and provide leverage for site acquisition and complementary investment by public and private partners.
