MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA HELD AT Georgia Southwestern State University, Americus, Georgia April 17-18, 2012

CALL TO ORDER

The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia met on Tuesday, April 17, 2012, and Wednesday, April 18, 2012, in Room 1100 of the Student Success Center, Georgia Southwestern State University, Americus, Georgia.

The Chair of the Board, Regent Benjamin J. Tarbutton, III, called the meeting to order at approximately 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, April 17, 2012, and again at 9:04 a.m. on Wednesday, April 18, 2012. Present on Tuesday and Wednesday, in addition to Chair Tarbutton, were Vice Chair William H. NeSmith, Jr. and Regents C. Dean Alford; Kenneth R. Bernard, Jr.; Larry R. Ellis; Rutledge A. Griffin, Jr.; Robert F. Hatcher; C. Thomas Hopkins, Jr.; Donald M. Leebern, Jr.; Doreen Stiles Poitevint; Neil L. Pruitt, Jr.; Richard L. Tucker; Larry Walker; and Philip A. Wilheit, Sr. Regent W. Mansfield Jennings, Jr. was excused on Tuesday but present on Wednesday. Regents James R. Jolly; Willis J. Potts, Jr.; and Kessel D. Stelling were excused both days.

The invocation and Pledge of Allegiance were given on both days by Regent C. Thomas Hopkins, Jr.

SAFETY BRIEFING

The safety briefing was given on Tuesday, April 17, 2012, by Georgia Southwestern State University Chief Oris Bryant.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of the Board of Regents meeting conducted March 13-14, 2012, and the special meetings conducted March 30, 2012, and April 13, 2012, were unanimously approved.

RECOGNITION OF SPECIAL GUESTS

Chair Tarbutton on Tuesday, April 17, 2012, recognized and welcomed State Rep. Mike Choakas of Americus.

RECOGNITION OF EXECUTIVE LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE SCHOLARS

Chair Tarbutton on Tuesday, April 17, 2012, recognized Chancellor Henry M. Huckaby and Assistant Vice Chancellor Tina Woodward, who introduced to the Board five of this year's Executive Leadership Institute Scholars: Susan Allen, Chief Budget Officer & Director of Payroll Services, Georgia College & State University; John Farrar, Science Department Head and Associate Professor of Chemistry, Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College; Frank Malinowski, Interim Dean of Science and Mathematics, Darton College; Angela Bryant, Director of Financial Aid, Georgia Southwestern State University; and Linda Hadley, Dean and Bill Head Professor of Finance, Columbus State University.

INSTITUTIONAL PRESIDENTIAL PRESENTATION

Dr. Kendall A. Blanchard, President of Georgia Southwestern State University, gave an informative presentation about the university.

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND BUSINESS OPERATIONS AS A COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

With motion made and unanimously seconded at approximately 10:36 a.m., Tuesday, April 17, 2012, Regent Philip Wilheit called to order the Committee on Finance and Business Operations as a Committee of the Whole. Vice Chancellor for Fiscal Affairs John Brown presented information on the University System's fiscal year 2012 and fiscal year 2013 budgets approved in the 2012 legislative session. Upon motion made and seconded by various individuals, the Board took the following actions:

1. The Board approved the allocation of state appropriations for fiscal year 2012 as shown on Appendix I attached;

- 2. The Board approved the resolution attached as Appendix II regarding the continuation of the Special Institutional Fee, effective fiscal year 2013;
- 3. The Board approved the tuition rates for fiscal year 2013 to be effective fall semester 2012, as shown on Appendix IIA (Undergraduate Tuition) and Appendix IIB (Graduate and Professional Programs);
- 4. The Board approved a revision to the Board of Regents Policy Manual, Section 7.3.4.1 Out-of-State Tuition Waivers, to read as follows:

International students and superior out-of-state students selected by the institution president or an authorized representative, provided that the number of such waivers in effect does not exceed four percent (4%) for the University of Georgia, Georgia Institute of Technology, Georgia State University, Georgia Health Sciences University, and two percent (2%) for all other institutions of the equivalent full-time students enrolled at the institution in the fall term immediately preceding the term for which the out-of-state tuition is to be waived.

- 5. The Board approved mandatory student fees for fiscal year 2013 for the institutions of the University System of Georgia to become effective fall semester 2012, as shown on Appendix III; and
- 6. The Board approved the allocation of state appropriations for fiscal year 2013 among the institutions and operating units of the University System of Georgia, pending the Governor's signing House Bill 742 (the Appropriations Act for FY 2013, as shown on Appendices IVA, IVB, and IVC

A copy of Vice Chancellor Brown's presentation is on file with, and available for inspection in, the Office of the Secretary to the Board. Mr. Brown concluded his presentation at 11:57 a.m., at which time the Committee of the Whole was adjourned.

COMMITTEE ON ACADEMIC AFFAIRS AS A COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

With motion made and unanimously seconded at approximately 1:50 p.m., Tuesday, April 17, 2012, Regent Doreen Stiles Poitevint called to order the Committee on Academic Affairs as a Committee of the Whole. Vice Chancellor for Educational Access and Success Lynne Weisenbach presented information on the Complete College America initiative, and the University System of Georgia's and Technical College System of Georgia's College Completion Summit. A copy of Vice Chancellor Weisenbach's presentation is on file with, and available for inspection in, the Office of the Secretary to the Board. Dr. Weisenbach concluded her presentation at 2:16 p.m., at which time the Committee of the Whole was adjourned.

COMMITTEE ON REAL ESTATE AND FACILITIES AS A COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

With motion made and unanimously seconded at approximately 9:05 a.m., Wednesday, April 18, 2012, Regent Larry Walker called to order the Committee on Real Estate and Facilities as a Committee of the Whole. Executive Vice Chancellor for Administration Steve Wrigley introduced Sandra Neuse, Assistant Vice Chancellor for Compliance and Operations, and Alan Travis, Director of Planning, who presented information on a space utilization study being conducted for University System of Georgia institutions' facilities. Joining the Board and presenting a panel discussion regarding the study at their respective campuses were Vice President for Business and Finance Bill Prigge, Southern Polytechnic State University; Associate Dean for Arts and Sciences John Campbell, Clayton State University; and Chief Data Officer and Registrar Tarrah Mirus, Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College. The presentation concluded her presentation at 9:55 a.m., at which time the Committee of the Whole was adjourned.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE: MAINTAINING AFFORDABILITY

With motion made and unanimously seconded at approximately 9:57 a.m., Wednesday, April 18, 2012, Regent Rutledge Griffin called to order a Committee of the Whole. Vice Chancellor for Fiscal Affairs John Brown introduced Georgia Institute of Technology Senior Vice President for Administration and Finance Amir Rahnamay-Azar, who made a presentation to the Board on maintaining affordability at the institution, focusing on a 2012-2013 pilot installment payment program. A copy of Dr. Rahnamay-Azar's presentation is on file with, and available for inspection in, the Office of the Secretary to the Board. Dr. Rahnamay-Azar concluded his presentation at 10:28 a.m., at which time the Committee of the Whole was adjourned.

CONSOLIDATION UPDATE

Chair Tarbutton on Wednesday, April 18, 2012, introduced Associate Vice Chancellor for Planning & Implementation Shelley Nickel, who presented to the Board an update on the Special Consolidation Committee's progress. Ms. Nickel informed the Board that mission statements for the institutions to be consolidated will focus on blending those of the individual institutions to be consolidated.

Ms. Nickel expects to present to the Board in May names for two consolidated institutions: those combining North Georgia College & State University and Gainesville State College; and Macon State and Middle Georgia College. The remaining pairs of institutions are still voting on potential names, which Ms. Nickel hopes to for the Board's consideration in July, and selection in August. The presidents of the institutions to be consolidated are working on organizational structures for the new institutions. Ms. Nickel said the committee is carefully examining admissions criteria and tuition of the four institutions that will result from consolidation.

A RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, cumulative state fund budget reductions at a time of increasing enrollment have presented a difficult challenge in preserving educational quality while meeting student needs;

WHEREAS, the Board of Regents and University System institutions have managed over \$1.4 billion in state fund reductions through eliminating staff and faculty positions, freezing and delaying hiring, reducing course offerings/program expansion efforts, increasing class size, and decreasing services such as student advising; increasing efficiencies, decreasing operating and travel expenditures, increasing deferred maintenance/decline in campus maintenance, reducing library holdings and requiring faculty and staff to take six furlough days;

WHEREAS, budget reductions in Fiscal Year 2009 resulted in the Board of Regents approving a temporary Special Institutional Fee for spring semester 2009;

WHEREAS, additional budget reductions in Fiscal Year 2010, Fiscal Year 2011 and Fiscal Year 2012 required the continuance of the Special Institutional Fee to maintain quality, offer courses for students to meet graduation requirements, meet increased enrollment demand and increased workload;

WHEREAS, the Fiscal Year 2012 budget did not include additional funding formula of \$145 million to recognize the growth in students and was essentially an additional budget reduction, thus leading to an increase in the Special Institutional Fee to offset the impact on quality and course offerings;

WHEREAS, the Fiscal Year 2013 budget provides a net increase in state funding but does not provide funding sufficient to allow for the termination of the Special Institutional Fee and the loss of \$210 million in revenue without adverse impact on students and institutions;

WHEREAS, the minutes of the Board of Regents meeting from April 2011 reflect a sunset date of June 30, 2012, for the Special Institutional Fee;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS that the Special Institutional Fee shall continue for Fiscal Year 2013;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board shall designate the Special Institutional Fee as a mandatory fee applying to all students except those specifically exempted in this resolution;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Special Institutional Fee shall be exempt or reduced for the following: A) Exempt all active duty military students; B) Reduce the Special Institutional Fee by 50 percent for all students taking less than 5 credit hours; C) Exempt joint enrolled students; D) Exemption for cross-registered students at multiple institutions who pay the Special Institutional Fee at the home institution only; and E) Exempt students who typically do not pay fees such as senior citizens;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Special Institutional Fee will be considered as continuing, and will be reevaluated annually as part of the Board's normal review of tuition and fees.

- 1. The Board approved establishment of a Doctor of Philosophy with a major in Environmental Health Science degree program at the University of Georgia.
- 2. The Board approved establishment of a Bachelor of Science in Exercise Science degree program at Georgia College & State University.
- 3. The Board approved establishment of a Master of Education for Reading Specialist Education degree program at Armstrong Atlantic State University.
- 4. The Board approved establishment of a Bachelor of Science with a major in Public Affairs degree program at the College of Coastal Georgia.
- 5. The Board approved termination of three degree programs at the University of Georgia: Bachelor of Science in Education with a major in Business Education; Bachelor of Science in Education with a major in Technology Studies; and a Bachelor of Science in Education with a major in Marketing Education.
- 6. The Board approved termination of five degree programs at Georgia College & State University: a Bachelor of Science with a major in Criminal Justice; a Bachelor of Science with a major in Public Administration; a Bachelor of Science with a major in Social Science; a Bachelor of Science with a major in Political Science; and a Bachelor of Science with a major in Sociology
- 7. The Board approved termination of three degree programs at Armstrong Atlantic State University: a Bachelor of Science in Education with a major in Biology Education; a Bachelor of Science in Education with a major in Chemistry Education; and a Graduate Certificate in Heritage Tourism.
- 8. The Board approved a revision to Policy Manual Section 3.7, Regents' Reading and Writing Skills Requirement. Board Policy 3.7 as revised:

Each USG institution shall ensure that students obtaining an associate or baccalaureate degree from a USG institution have competence in reading and writing.

Consistent with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools requirements for accreditation, the Board of Regents expects all institutions to assess reading and writing skills and to use those assessments for continuous improvement. All USG institutions should be prepared to demonstrate the following to the Board:

- a) assessment policies and procedures used to measure student reading and writing competency;
- b) how the assessment of reading and writing has been used for continuous improvement;
- c) data to show how students are performing in terms of reading and writing skills.

- 9. The Board approved establishment of the Georgia Athletic Association Professorship in Pharmacy at the University of Georgia.
- 10. The Board also approved certain named faculty appointments, copies of which are on file with, and available for inspection in, the Office of the Secretary to the Board.

Wilheit, Sr. Regent James R. Jolly was absent. Board Vice Chair William H. NeSmith, Jr. also was in attendance.

- 1. The committee heard an information item on funding for Graduate Medical Education requested by the Board of Regents during the 2012 legislative season. The Board was awarded \$1.2 million to help expand the number of available Graduate Medical Education positions, in order to meet Georgia's growing need for physicians.
- 2. The Committee on Organization and Law met on Tuesday, April 17, 2012, at approximately 3:15 p.m. in Room 2413 of the Student Success Center, Georgia Southwestern State University, Americus, Georgia. Committee members in attendance were Chair Larry W. Ellis; Regents C. Dean Alford; Rutledge A. Griffin, Jr.; Doreen Stiles Poitevint; and Neil L. Pruitt, Jr. Regents W. Mansfield Jennings; Willis J. Potts, Jr.; and Kessel D. Stelling, Jr., were absent. Board Chair Benjamin Tarbutton III, also was in attendance.

- 1. The committee discussed the University System of Georgia's policy on employment of relatives, also called nepotism. This discussion was for information purposes only and no action was taken.
- 2. The Board approved a revision to the Policy Manual, Section 3.8.4 Honorary Degrees, to read as follows:

Honorary degrees are subject to approval by the Board of Regents. Honorary degrees may be conferred by USG research, regional, or state universities and state colleges to persons of notable achievement in an academic field, the arts and letters, the professions, or public service. An institutionally approved process for advancing candidates for consideration in a timely fashion shall include recommendations by a faculty committee and selection by the president of a candidate to be communicated to the Chancellor. Honorary degrees may be conferred upon candidates recommended by the Chancellor and approved by the Board of Regents.

Current elected or appointed national office holders or officials of the State of Georgia to whom the USG institutions are directly or indirectly answerable, as well as persons who are announced candidates for national or state elective offices are ineligible for honorary degrees. Current Regents and all current USG employees are also ineligible.

Relatively few awards should be given. No individual shall receive more than one (1) honorary degree from a USG institution. The recipient must be present to receive the degree (BoR Minutes, June 1995, p. 34; September 1998, p. 92; April 2012).

- 3. The Board approved two requests to award honorary degrees, from the Georgia Institute of Technology to Dr. Santiago Calatrava, and from the University of West Georgia to Mr. Paul A. Cadenhead.
- 4. The Board authorized a resolution allowing the University of Georgia to apply for transportation funding through the United States Department of Transportation.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE COMMITTEE ON REAL ESTATE AND FACILITIES

The Committee on Real Estate & Facilities met on Tuesday, April 17, 2012, at approximately 2:50 p.m. in Room 1100 of the Student Success Center, Georgia Southwestern State University, Americus, Georgia. Committee members in attendance were Chair Larry Walker; Vice Chair Donald M. Leebern, Jr.; and Regents Kenneth R. Bernard, Jr.; Robert F. Hatcher; C. Thomas Hopkins, Jr.; Richard L. Tucker; and Philip A. Wilheit, Sr. Regent James R. Jolly was absent. Board Vice Chair William H. NeSmith, Jr. also was in attendance.

- 1. The committee heard an information item on integrated evaluation of campus facilities related proposals. Projects that may be further developed for consideration of project authorization by the Board include: expansion of Student Recreation & Wellness Center at Southern Polytechnic State University; renovation of Norton Hall at Southern Polytechnic State University; and construction of a new Student Health and Counseling Center at Georgia Southern University.
- 2. The committee heard a report on real estate acquisitions approved in executive session that have closed, including: 4.05 Acres, Pilgrim Mill Road, Cumming, on behalf of North Georgia College and State University, during the August 9, 2011, Board meeting; 6.08 Acres, 2808 North Ashley Street, Valdosta, on behalf of Valdosta State University during the September 13, 2011, Board meeting; 104 Acres, Lanier Drive and Veterans Memorial Parkway, Statesboro, on behalf of Georgia Southern University, during the November 8, 2011, Board meeting; 3.11 Acres, 315 Irwin Street and 89-103 Fort Street, Atlanta, Georgia State University, during the November 8, 2011, Board meeting.
- 3. The Board authorized Project No. PPV-10-1201, Bolton Dining Commons Replacement at the University of Georgia, with a total project budget of \$26,700,000, to be funded from approximately \$4,000,000 in university food service reserves and approximately \$22,700,000 through a public-private venture. Details of this project and the Board's approval are on file and available for inspection in the Office of Facilities.
- 4. The Board authorized Project No. BR-80-1203, Renovation of Donaldson Dining Hall at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College, with a total project budget of \$2,600,000, to be funded from \$2,300,000 in ABAC auxiliary funds and \$300,000 in ABAC Foundation funds. Details of this project and the Board's approval are on file and available for inspection in the Office of Facilities.
- 5. The Board authorized appointment of a design professional firm for Project No. BR-30-1204, Renovation of Glenn and Towers Residence Halls at the Georgia Institute of Technology. The Board appointed the first-named construction management firm. Should it not be possible to execute a contract with the top-ranked firm, staff will then attempt to execute a contract with the other firms listed in rank order.

Project No. BR-30-1204, Renovation of Glenn and Towers Residence Halls, Georgia Institute of Technology

Project Description: This project was authorized by the Board in March 2012. As part of its Student Housing Master Plan March 2009 Georgia Institute of Technology has planned a housing renovation program that will renovate nine residence halls between FY 2010 and FY 2019. Under the previous Student Housing Comprehensive Plan - 1998, seven residence halls were renovated. In August 2009 the Board approved renovation of Freeman, Montag, and

Fitten Residence Halls under the Plan. The comprehensive renovation of Glenn and Towers Residence Halls, is the next planned renovation project as part of this plan. These two residence halls will be connected by a 10,000 sf building which will provide space for group study, meetings, laundry, exercise, offices, a main lobby, restrooms, and consolidated mechanical services. The project will be funded from GIT auxiliary housing funds.

Total Project Cost:\$41,500,000Construction Cost (Stated Cost Limitation):\$30,200,000

- 6. The Board approved a gift of real property, 755 Marietta Street, Atlanta, from GT Real Estate Services, LLC, for the use and benefit of the Georgia Institute of Technology. The Board recommended that the legal details involved with accepting this gift of real property be handled by the Georgia Department of Law. Acquisition of this real property is consistent with the GIT master plan.
- 7. The Board approved an amendment to a rental agreement for Chastain Pointe, 1200 Chastain Road, on behalf of Kennesaw State University. KSU Chastain Pointe Real Estate Foundation, LLC, will rent the location to KSU as a warehouse for central receiving and distribution for the period May 1, 2012, through June 30, 2013, at a monthly rent of \$9,441.67, with options to renew on a year-to-year basis for the remaining option periods contained in the rental agreement at the same rent rate for the use of Kennesaw State University. KSU will invest approximately \$150,000 to improve the space for use by KSU as a warehouse for central receiving and distribution. Details of this agreement and the Board's approval are on file and available for inspection in the Office of Facilities.
- 8. The Board approved a gift of real property, ground lease, and rental agreement for the Varsity Athletic Complex at Georgia Gwinnett College. The facilities will accommodate the new intercollegiate athletic program, and will include an athletics building composed of locker rooms, training rooms and offices; soccer field, baseball and softball fields; tennis facilities, stadium seating; and site amenities. The Board recommended that the legal details involved with accepting this gift of real property be handled by the Georgia Department of Law. Details of this agreement and the Board's approval are on file and available for inspection in the Office of Facilities.
- 9. The Board approved demolition of one building and two parking structures at 60 Peachtree Center Avenue, on behalf of Georgia State University. The Board determined the facilities are no longer advantageously useful to GSU or other units of the University System of Georgia, and authorized demolition and removal of this building and these two parking facilities, requesting also that the Governor issue Executive Orders authorizing the demolition and removal of this building and these two parking facilities; and recommending that demolition and removal of these structures be subject to conducting a hazardous materials survey and assessment to identify the presence of asbestos-containing materials or other hazardous materials and completion of any associated abatement, management, and/or disposal measures prior to or during demolition to ensure

compliance with environmental regulations. Details of this demolition and the Board's approval are on file and available for inspection in the Office of Facilities.

- 10. The Board approved naming of the Academic III Building at Gainesville State College the J. Foster Watkins Building, in recognition of Dr. J. Foster Watkins.
- 11. The Board approved naming of the Academic II Building at Gainesville State College the Loyd Strickland Building, in recognition of Mr. Loyd Strickland.
- 12. The Board approved the naming of the Art Museum at the Kennesaw State University the Bernard A. Zuckerman Museum of Art, in recognition of Mr. Bernard A. Zuckerman.
- The Board approved the naming of the Academic Sciences Building at Atlanta Metropolitan College the Elridge W. McMillan Academic Sciences Building, in recognition of Regent Elridge W. McMillan.
- 14. The Board approved a resolution for transfer of surplus Federal property from the Department of Education to the Board of Regents, for the use and benefit of Columbus State University. A copy of this resolution is attached as Exhibit A.

EXHIBIT A

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, certain real property owned by the United States of America, located in the County of Muscogee, State of Georgia, has been declared surplus to the needs of the Federal government and is subject to assignment for disposal for educational purposes by the Secretary of Education, under the provisions of Section 203(k)(1)(a) of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949 (63 Stat. 377) (Act), as amended, and rules and regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, more particularly described as follows:

The U.S. Army Reserve Center # on Macon Road consists of approximately 2.2 acres of land and is bound on the north by 17th Street, on the East by Preston Lane, on the South by Macon Road and on the West by Dell Drive.

There are two brick buildings with steel roofs consisting of approximately 11,000 square feet on this property. The larger building has office space, meeting areas and storage space. The smaller building has two work bays which appear to have been built for vehicle maintenance.

WHEREAS, Columbus State University needs and can utilize said property for educational purposes in accordance with the requirements of said Act and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder of which this Board is fully informed, including commitments regarding use and time within such use shall commence.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Columbus State University shall make application to the Secretary of Education for, and secure the transfer to it of, the above-mentioned property for said use upon and subject to such exceptions, reservations, terms, covenants, agreements, conditions and restrictions as the Secretary of Education, or his authorized representative may require in connection with the disposal of said property under said Act and rules and regulations issued thereto; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Columbus State University has legal authority and is willing and is in a position financially and otherwise to assume immediate care and maintenance of the property, and that Timothy Mescon, President, Columbus State University, is/are hereby authorized, for and on behalf of the Columbus State University to do and perform any and all acts and things which may be necessary to carry out the foregoing resolution including the preparing, making and filing of plans, applications, reports and other documents; the execution, acceptance, delivery and recordation of agreements, deeds and other instruments pertaining to the transfer of said property; and the payment of any and all sums necessary on account of the purchase price thereof including fees or costs incurred in connection with the transfer of said property for surveys, title searches, real estate appraisals, recordation of instruments or costs associated with escrow arrangements; together with any payments necessary by virtue of nonuse or deferral of use of the property. If the applicant is unable to place the property into use (or determines that a deferral of use should occur),

IT IS UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that Columbus State University will pay to the United States Department of Education for each month of nonuse beginning twelve (12) months after the date of the deed, or thirty-six (36) months where construction or major renovation is contemplated, the sum of 1/360th of the then-current fair market value of the property for each month of nonuse.
