Introduction to SIRS 2000 Revision

Two years ago the SIRS committee undertook a massive project: the first complete review and revision of SIRS since it was created in 1981. Those revisions are now complete, and the revisions will be phased in during Fall 2000 and Summer 2001. The SIRS Committee focused on the following:

♦ The validity of what we are currently collecting; improving data quality

Are definitions of fields standard across the System? Are changes in definitions of data elements necessary to improve data quality? Are new standards necessary? For example, we have collected data on hours earned since 1983, but institutional definitions varied. For the new revision, we have defined two variables: one using a System standard and the other using varying institutional definitions of hours earned.

♦ The set of data elements in SIRS

Are we collecting the right information? Are the variables adequate to reflect current Board policies and procedures? Are they adequate for future planning and policy analysis? Are they adequate for federal and regional reporting? Do we still need to collect each data element? Do we need new or revised data elements?

♦ The most efficient use of institutional resources and System investments

Where possible, we have defined codes for SIRS fields to be the same as Banner fields. Historically, we have tried to be parsimonious in adding new elements to SIRS, but institutions now have the ability to produce different kinds of information useful to System work because of Banner. We want to make better use of what is easily available through Banner.

We have also worked to incorporate elements into SIRS that are currently collected through other means. For example, institutions submit data for the Cooperative Instructional Improvement Feedback Project every July. Our goal is to reduce the number of additional data submissions from the institutions and to consolidate what we can into SIRS.

The first set of changes are contained in this document. Revisions for Phase II will follow later in the summer.

This code must change when a student changes from an undergraduate to graduate or professional level. For example, for a student who first enrolled as a freshman in Fall Semester 2000 (coded as 20012), graduated with a baccalaureate degree in 2005, and then enrolled as a graduate student in Fall Semester 2005, use a new code for the record on that student in the Fall 2005 report.

Code 3 is used in historical SIRS files to indicate Winter Quarter.

BANNER TABLES: Term code must be entered on SGASTDN. Term is selected by matching the field SGBSTDN_TERM_CODE_MATRIC (SGASTDN) with ZORTRMT (ZOATRMT) to extract the SIRS equivalent. Institutions must enter SGBSTDN_TERM_CODE_MATRIC. Although the field is optional in BANNER, it is required for SIRS.

Code 3 was used prior to Fall 1998 to indicate Winter Quarter. GIT used Code 3 through 1999 to indicate Winter Ouarter.

- If date of high school graduation is unknown for students who have been out of high school more than five years, estimate a date.
- For home school students, use the year of home school completion.

This field should be blank for graduate and professional students. It may be blank for transfer students.

Required for all students matriculating from high school, GED, or from home schools who are not being admitted as non-traditional students. Report if available for all students, regardless of student level or admissions type.

Use the following missing data codes:

- 98 For foreign students or non-native English speaking students who have been exempted from the SAT, code 98.
- For non-traditional students without SAT, code 99.

Do not remove SAT scores from records of returning students.

All scores must be recentered after Summer 1996.

Note to SIRS Users: Be sure to restrict data to valid codes (do not use missing data codes as values in calculations). Multiply SAT by 10 to get true range of SAT from 200 to 800.

CODES, CATEGORIES, AND COMMENTS:

- 1. Element Size: 2 numeric digits
- **2. Valid Codes**: Refer to element G103 (General Operations Data Element dictionary) Institution Code (Norms) for codes.

Notes:

- 1. For undergraduate students, use the code for the previous institution attended.
- 2. Until Summer 2001, for graduate students and First Professional students, enter the institution that awarded the baccalaureate degree. (This will be replaced with a new field in Summer 2001.)
- 3. For student level 51 (unclassified undergraduate with a baccalaureate degree--see element S301), use the institution which awarded the previous college degree.
- 4. Enter the code of technical institutes (see appendix).
- 5. For all non-system/non-DTAE Georgia institutions, use code 88.

000 is different from a blank. 000 means that a student is a transfer with attempted transfer hours but no earned transfer hours.

The result obtained by dividing the total number of credit hours attempted at all postsecondary institutions previously attended into the total number of quality points earned at previous institutions.

Excludes institutional credit hours. This is sometimes called the "Regents Transfer GPA" by Banner institutions. This transfer GPA is calculated in a standard way across all institutions.

1. Element Size: 3 numeric digits with two implied decimal places (right-justified).

2. Valid Codes: 000 - 400 for undergraduates with transfer hours attempted

SIRS Data Element Dictionary Appendix A Glossary of Terms

June 30, 2000 Revisions (Originally issued March 1988)

- Users should note that some terms are maintained in the Glossary for historical purposes. For example, while the System is now on the semester calendar, the definition of "quarter" is maintained for those who use older SIRS files.
- <u>Academic Year</u> The consecutive period of three quarters, Fall, Winter and Spring quarters, or two semesters, Fall through Spring.
- <u>Aliens, Non-Resident</u> Persons who have been admitted to the United States but not for permanent residence.
- Aliens, Resident Persons who have been lawfully admitted for permanent residence (in past SIRS SDEDs, the student was specified as one holding a "green card," Form 1-151) and who can hold permanent full-time employment within the United States.
- American College Testing (ACT) Program Scores An entrance test given by the American College Testing Program, composed of English, Math, Science, and Social Science sections, with a composite score.
- <u>Auditor</u> A person who has registered and paid fees for a course but who has elected not to receive credit for participation in the course.
- <u>Calendar</u> The System was on the quarter calendar through Summer 1998 (except for Georgia Institute of Technology, which was on the quarter calendar through Summer 1999).
- <u>Career Associate Degrees</u> Associate degree programs are designed to prepare a student for a particular occupation. These programs are not designed to provide preparation for transfer (they are not core curriculum programs).
- <u>Census Date, Enrollment</u> The officially designated day in an academic term, after the last day of drop/add, when the institution takes the official student count for the term. This date is recommended by the SIRS Committee and RACRA and finalized by the Chancellor's Office.
- <u>Classification of Instructional Programs Code (CIP)</u> A six-digit taxonomy code developed by the National Center for Education Statistics for classifying academic programs. The CIP taxonomy replaced the four-digit HEGIS taxonomy code in 1983.
- <u>College Preparatory Curriculum (CPC)</u> The minimum high school course of study required of students graduating from high school in and after the spring of 1988 for admission to programs leading to the baccalaureate degree. Failure to complete the CPC in high school can result in a student taking college courses without receiving college credit.
- <u>College Placement Examination (CPE)</u> An examination consisting of tests in reading, English, and mathematics, used for learning support (earlier termed "development studies") placement testing of students enrolling in Summer 1988 or later. The exam is also used for LS exit testing.

- <u>COMPASS</u> A computerized examination comparable to the CPE, consisting of tests in reading, English, and mathematics, used for learning support (earlier termed "development studies") placement and exit testing.
- <u>Contact Hour</u> A unit of measure that represents an hour (50 minutes) of scheduled instruction given to one student in one week. For instruction delivered through lectures, one contact hour yields one hour of credit. In physical education, laboratory or studio courses, two contact hours yield one credit hour.
- <u>Continuing Education Courses</u> Non-degree credit activities offered through a variety of conferences, institutes, short courses, seminars, and special training programs. Continuing education units (CEU's) are awarded for completion of such courses. CEUs are not reported through SIRS, and continuing education courses are not reported through CIR.
- <u>Continuing Education Unit (CEU)</u> A unit awarded to participants in organized non-degree credit activities; defined as 10 contact hours of participation in an organized continuing education experience under responsible sponsorship, capable direction, and qualified instruction.
- <u>Cooperative Education (Co-op) Program</u> Program in which a student enrolls in college and then works at a job related to his or her major during alternate terms; or enrolls and works at a program-related job during the same term.
- <u>Core Curriculum</u> A specified curriculum in each University System of Georgia institution for the general purpose of facilitating the student's educational progress and transferability in the first two-years of pursuit of the baccalaureate degree, within and among the units of the University System. Each institution's core curriculum is published on the Web.
- <u>Course</u> An organized set of activities pertaining to instruction in a particular subject matter, which is conducted during a given period of time (usually a term) and for which credit toward graduation or certification is usually given.
- <u>Credit by Examination</u> Academic credit which is awarded to the student by the institution based on performance on examinations and is accepted in lieu of enrollment in and completion of credit courses.
- <u>Credit Courses</u> Courses for which, upon successful completion, enrolled students are given credit that can be applied to meet the requirements for achieving a degree or certificate at a given institution (in contrast to continuing education courses or LS courses).
- <u>Credit Hour</u> The basic unit of measuring credit for instruction received.
- <u>Curriculum</u> The course of study (prescribed set of courses) leading to the attainment of a degree or certificate.

<u>Deactivated Program</u> The temporary suspension of an educational program, degree, or major. Such action must be reported to Academic Affairs. The deactivation period should not exceed two academic years, and during this period, no new students can be admitted. At the end of the period, a decision should be made to reactivate or seek Board approval to discontinue (see Discontinued Program). Deactivation does not remove a program from the list of authorized offerings for an institution.

<u>Degree</u> An award (e.g., Bachelor of Science, Associate of Science) conferred upon the student for the successful completion of a given program or curriculum.

<u>Degree Program Levels</u> The levels at which an institution offers formal awards or recognition in each program:

- 1. Certificate (one year or more) Program. A career program designed for completion in one to two academic years and terminating in the award of a certificate. (Certificates of less than one year are not recorded in Degrees and Majors Authorized.)
- 2. Associate Degree Program. An educational program below the baccalaureate level that requires at least two but fewer than four academic years of postsecondary-education work, and that terminates in the award of an associate degree.
- 3. Bachelor's Degree Program. An educational program that generally requires four to five academic years and that terminates in the award of a bachelor's degree.
- 4. Master's Degree Program. An educational program at the graduate level that terminates in any earned academic degree carrying the title of master. In liberal arts and sciences, the degree customarily is granted on successful completion of one or two academic years of work beyond the bachelor's level. In professional fields, it is an advanced professional degree carrying the master's designation (for example MSW, Master of Social Work) earned after the baccalaureate.
- 5. Education Specialist Program. A self-contained degree program in education that is between the master's and doctor's degree both in time and depth. Generally, a minimum of 45 quarter credit hours or 30 semester credit hours beyond the Master's degree is required. The Ed.S. degree program is designed to provide advanced study for those preparing for positions in education which call for a higher level of specialization than that of the master's degree.
- 6. First-Professional Degree Program. An educational program that terminates in an earned degree in a professional field. Degrees included are Doctor of Medicine, Doctor of Dental Medicine, Doctor of Veterinary Medicine, Doctor of Pharmacy, and Juris Doctorate.
- 7. Doctoral Degree Program. An educational program at the graduate level that terminates in any earned academic degree carrying the title of doctor, including both Ph.D.s and Ed.D.s. Not included in this category are first professional degrees such as M.D. or D.D.M.

<u>Developmental Studies</u> A program of study whereby a student who has below college-level proficiency in English, reading, or mathematics may develop those abilities to a college level. Developmental Studies courses are not considered college credit. Any student taking a developmental studies course is classified as a developmental studies student. DS is now called Learning Support (LS).

- <u>Discipline</u> A branch of knowledge such as biology, English, sociology, or history.
- <u>Discontinued Program</u> The termination of an educational program, degree, or major. The request for such action along with the rationale must be submitted to Senior Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs for review and finally to the Board of Regents for approval. Discontinuation deletes the program from the authorized offerings of an institution. Discontinuation is equivalent to termination of a program.
- <u>Early Admission Student</u> An academically talented student who enrolls in a University System institution full-time following completion of the junior year in high school. Such students must meet established admissions criteria to enroll.
- Equivalent Full-Time (EFT) Enrollment An enrollment unit used in the SER, calculated by dividing total quarter credit hours (QCH) generated at the institution by 15 for any quarter (EFT = Total QCH/15) or semester credit hours divided by 15 for any semester. The annual EFT enrollment is calculated by dividing total quarter credit hours for the fiscal year by 45 (Annual EFT = Total Fiscal Year QCH/45) or by 30 for semesters. Note that there are several other definitions of EFT enrollment in use in higher education.
- External Degree Program An organized curriculum leading to a degree offered in its entirety by a System institution at an off-campus site. Such programs must be authorized by the Board, and it must be determined that all necessary facilities, faculty, staff, and supporting resources are available or can be provided at the off-campus location with standards equal to those maintained on campus.
- <u>FICE Code</u> A six-digit code assigned by the Federal Interagency Committee on Education (FICE) to each higher education institution; this code never changes regardless of changes in an institution's level.
- Financial Aid A system of financial assistance to help students meet their educational expenses.
- <u>First Professional Student</u> Student enrolled in veterinary medicine, law, medicine, dentistry, pharmacy (doctorate). This definition satisfies federal reporting.
- <u>First Professional-B Student</u> Used before Summer 2000 in SIRS to refer to undergraduate students enrolled in forestry, pharmacy (baccalaureate), journalism, or social work (beyond the sophomore level) at the University of Georgia only. When this code was in use, first professional students were called "First Professional-A" students.
- <u>Fiscal Year</u> The twelve-month period of time beginning July 1 and ending the following June 30. In terms of academic quarters, a fiscal year includes the continuous period from Summer quarter through Spring quarter; in terms of semesters, a fiscal year includes Summer term, Fall semester, and Spring semester.

- <u>Full-Time Student, Graduate</u> A graduate student who is enrolled in at least 10 quarter credit hours or 9 semester hours at the graduate level.
- <u>Full-Time Student, Undergraduate</u> An undergraduate student who is enrolled in 12 or more quarter credit hours or 12 or more semester credit hours.
- General Educational Developmental (GED) Test A high school equivalency examination.
- <u>Geographic Origin (County)</u> The county of residence in which the student legally resided at the time of admission to the institution.
- <u>Geographic Origin (State)</u> The state of legal residence at the time of first admission to the institution as an Undergraduate, Graduate, or First Professional student.
- <u>Graduate/Professional-Level Course</u> Graduate level (Master's, Education Specialist, and Doctorate) and professional level (medicine, veterinary medicine, dentistry, and law) course.
- <u>Graduate Student</u> A student pursuing a course of study beyond the baccalaureate degree level (includes master's, education specialist, and doctoral programs; does not include professional programs).
- Grants (Student Financial Aid) Student aid which does not have to be repaid.
- <u>Guaranteed Student Loan</u> Program for eligible undergraduate and graduate students to borrow funds directly from banks, creditors, savings and loans, and other lenders who voluntarily participate in the program.
- <u>Headcount Enrollment</u> Unduplicated number of enrolled students within an institution as of the official census date.
- <u>HEGIS (Higher Education General Information Survey)</u> The federal data acquisition program formerly operated by the National Center for Education Statistics. The program was replaced by the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) beginning in 1986-87.
- <u>HEGIS Taxonomy Code</u> The four-digit code for classifying instructional programs which was developed by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES). The taxonomy was replaced in 1983 by the six-digit Classification of Instructional Program (CIP) code.
- <u>Housing</u> Student residential units including single student, fraternity/sorority, and married student apartments, only if such units are owned or controlled by the college or university.
- <u>Housing Capacity</u> Total student spaces available in institutional housing, as of the housing census date, including only those spaces normally occupied. Note that this information is no longer collected (June 2000).

- <u>Housing Occupancy</u> The number of students living in institutional housing as of the housing census date; includes students living in over-capacity space as well as normal capacity space.
- <u>In-state Student</u> Student who is legally domiciled in Georgia for tuition purposes.
- <u>Institutional Credit</u> Credit assigned to remedial courses, such as learning support (or DS) courses or Regents' Test remediation courses. This credit cannot be counted toward meeting the requirements for a certificate or degree.
- <u>Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS)</u> The federal data acquisition system implemented by the Office for Educational Research and Improvement (OERI), U.S. Department of Education, in 1986-87. This system of surveys replaced the HEGIS surveys.
- <u>Joint Enrollment Student</u> An academically talented student who is enrolled in courses for college credit while continuing in high school. Such students must meet established criteria to participate in the program.
- <u>Learning Support</u> A program of study whereby a student who has below college-level proficiency in English, reading, or mathematics may develop those abilities to a college level. Learning Support courses are not considered college credit.
- <u>Legal Residence</u>, <u>State of</u> The state in which the student is legally domiciled for tuition purposes.
- <u>Loans (Student Financial Aid)</u> Money borrowed by the student to cover college costs which must be repaid along with interest over a specified period of time.
- <u>Lower Division/Level Courses</u> Learning Support (0-099 level numbers), freshman (1000 level numbers), and sophomore (2000 level numbers) courses.
- <u>Lower Division/Level Student</u> Undergraduate student who has successfully completed (generally) less than 90 quarter or 60 semester credit hours; includes student levels of freshman and sophomore. Before 1993, Developmental Studies was considered a student level.
- <u>Major</u> A field of study (e.g., political science) which leads to award of a degree. A major may be offered in more than one degree structure (e.g., B.A. in Political Science, B.S. in Political Science). University System academic program guidelines specify the following:
 - Major 21 semester hours or more of upper-division courses in a field of study. Majors require BOR approval; minors do not.
 - Minor 15 to 18 semester hours of coursework, with at least 9 hours of upper-division courses in a field of study other than the student's major.

Teaching Field A broad teaching field within the secondary education major.

- <u>Merit Scholarship</u> Funds awarded in recognition of a student's special academic abilities, talents, interests or participation in certain programs without regard to financial need (non-need based).
- Non-Degree Students A student who has been admitted with the explicit understanding that he or she is not pursuing a formal degree or certificate. These students may earn credits.
- Off-Campus Courses offered anywhere other than in the facilities or on the grounds of the institution. Excluded are those instructional activities which are an integral part of on-campus instructional programs, but take students away from the campus for a special learning experience (e.g., clinical experiences, student teaching, field work).
- Out-of-State Students Students who are legally domiciled outside the State of Georgia for tuition purposes.
- <u>Part-Time Student, Graduate</u> A graduate student who is enrolled in less than 9 semester credit hours at the graduate level. This definition also includes First Professional students (medical, dentistry, law, and veterinary medicine students).
- <u>Part-Time Student, Undergraduate</u> An undergraduate student who is enrolled in less than 12 semester credit hours.
- <u>Pell Grant</u> Federal student aid program administered by the U.S. government; the grant is need-based and does not have to be repaid.
- <u>Perkins Loan</u> A federal low-interest loan program for undergraduate and graduate students. Repayment is required starting six months after graduation, or after leaving college or becoming less than a half-time student.
- <u>Program Area (Budget Request)</u> The five formula groups used for developing the University System budget request to the Governor and Legislature. Disciplines are grouped into the three following broad program areas ranging from low cost (Group 1) to high cost (Group 3). Groups 4 and 5 are designated as special programs and are assigned to a separate classification.
 - Group 1: Law, Letters, Library Science, Psychology, Social Sciences
 - Group 2: Area Studies, Business, Communications, Education, Home Economics, Mathematics, Public Affairs, Interdisciplinary Studies
 - Group 3: Agriculture, Architecture, Biological Sciences, Computer Science, Engineering, Fine and Applied Arts, Foreign Languages, Health Professions, Physical Sciences, Technologies
 - Group 4: Remedial or Learning Support Programs
 - Group 5: Medicine, Dentistry, Veterinary Medicine
- Quarter The uniform calendar system whereby each institution in the University System structured its courses for the calendar year through Summer 1998. Each regular quarter during the academic year (Fall through Spring) consisted of the equivalent of eleven calendar weeks of

instruction, including allowance for registration, examination, and reporting of grades to the registrar. Ten full weeks of instruction (a minimum of 47 class days) were required. The duration of a summer quarter was more flexible, either sub-divided and/or shortened, as long as the equivalent instruction time was met.

- Quarter Credit Hour (QCH) The measure of the activity of one student in course work for not less than 50 minutes a week over a period of one academic quarter (10 weeks) or the equivalent. A minimum of 500 minutes of instruction was required for each quarter credit hour awarded.
- <u>Regents' Test</u> Test developed by the University System to assess the status of student competence in the areas of reading and writing. The test is composed of a 60-item multiple choice test, designed to assess vocabulary, comprehension, and analysis skills, and an essay. Passing both parts of the test is a requirement for graduation from undergraduate degree programs (associate and baccalaureate).
- Scholastic Assessment Test (SAT) Scores An entrance test given by the Educational Testing Service which is composed of a quantitative (math) and a verbal section. The range of possible scores for each section is 200-800 in intervals of 10.
- <u>Section</u> A group of students who are scheduled to meet together for instruction as a regularly scheduled, organized class with one or more instructors under a specified course number or a group of students or a single student assigned to one or more instructors for independent or supervised study (including clinical work, student teaching, thesis supervision, etc.) under a specified course number, or a single student assigned to an instructor for individual teaching under a specified course number.
- <u>Semester</u> A semester is at least fifteen calendar weeks (minimum of 150 class days per year excluding registration and final examination periods) in length. All institutions begin classes during the same week, with the exception of the medical school component of Medical College of Georgia.
- <u>Transfer Programs</u> Associate degree level coursework which meets the requirements of the Core Curriculum and is therefore creditable toward a baccalaureate degree.
- <u>Transfer Student</u> A student who has attempted courses at another institution prior to matriculating at the present institution.

<u>Type of Institution</u> A Board of Regents designation for System institutions:

Research Universities Regional Universities State Universities State Colleges Two-Year Colleges

- <u>Undergraduate Student</u> A student enrolled in a bachelor's degree program, an associate-degree program, or a certificate (career or vocational-technical) program.
- <u>Uniform Academic Calendar</u> The earliest beginning and latest ending date for each term as approved by the Chancellor.
- <u>Upper Division/Level</u> Junior (3000 level number) and senior (4000, and sometimes 5000 level) courses.
- <u>Upper Division/Level Student</u> Undergraduate student who has successfully completed 60 semester credit hours or more; includes student levels juniors and seniors.
