

Applicants must be the following minimum criteria:

1. U.S. citizen at least 18 years of age.
2. In good academic standing.
3. Must be enrolled in school during the semester the student plans to intern.
4. Recommended by their college or university to participate in the program.
5. Have met or be willing to meet the requirements for internships for their respective institutions.



## Program Requirements

Program is open to full-time students pursuing an undergraduate or graduate degree at an accredited college or university in business administration, criminal justice, political science, public administration, conflict resolution, or related field of study.

Students must be juniors or seniors in undergraduate school or first year graduate students in order to participate in the program.

# Safety & Security Intern Program

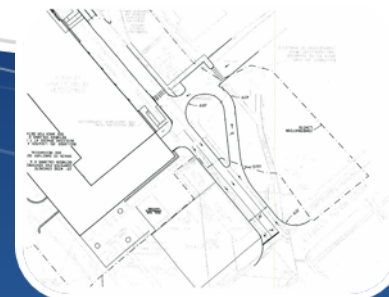
The Board of Regents, University System Office (BOR-USO) Safety & Security Internship Program is created to provide a valuable learning experience for college and university students by engaging them in projects and tasks that support safe and secure campus environments within the University System of Georgia.



*Intern opportunities are available state-wide and allow interns to interact with a variety of positions in the higher education environment. Interns may work in teams, work with specific institutions or provide support for programs that benefit all 35 colleges and universities within the University System of Georgia.*

## Four Program Areas

1. Risk Management – focus on reducing exposures in workers compensation claims, auto liability, safety training, property management, accident investigation and program evaluation.
2. Emergency Operations Planning/Preparedness & Mitigation – activities may include attending emergency planning meetings, assist in reviewing existing and proposed plans, assist in hazard mitigation efforts and research in to best practices.
3. Violence Against Women Act program – research and/or assist in the development of processes to improve the successful identification and prosecution



of offenders. Support current and ongoing efforts to improve the capabilities of residence life, student affairs, campus and local law enforcement officers in responding to violent acts.

4. Public Safety – projects may include research, evaluation of new technologies, improving organizational processes and procedures, identifying best practices.
